Thanks to all who are contributing to the on-going dialogue. The March meeting will allow all parties to get together in one place and at one time to do a review that is based on fully current and accurate information, and decide on marching orders for the remaining months of the school year.

# Meet Our New Interim Principal

Here's a brief introduction to Mr. Rembert Seaward, who is completing his fourth week at Shepherd Elementary before he takes over the reins from Mrs. Miles, who intends to start her maternity leave March 16 (although you never can tell with these things).

Mr. Seaward is 50 years old and was born in Southeast D.C. He has three sisters, all of whom work for the federal government, and his parents have been married 53 years. Mr. Seaward himself is married with four children - two are in college and other two are ages 9 and 5.

Mr. Seaward has worked at two other D.C. public schools, helping out while other principals are on leave. He didn't exactly come out and say that Shepherd is the best place he's worked at this school year, but during the February 18 PTA meeting he did say, "I'm humbled to be working here."

# PTA Roundup

I would like to reiterate the following points, if they were not clear in my message in last Friday's *Mustang*:

Several of the contributions made in response to our appeals over the past couple of months were intended – by those who made them – to be used to fund Ms. Agoussi's position. It is these "earmarked" funds that we are using to pay Ms. Agoussi's fees through April 3. However, we will not do that any longer, as we do not see that the President, Treasurer, and PTA Board of Directors as a whole, have the authority to manage all parents' contributions in a way that singles out one line item that will be continuously funded on a first-priority basis.

The Board has been as transparent as possible in accounting for and publicly reporting on all the funds it has received from the start of the year, and on how it has used that income to meet budgeted expenditures - on all line items. Monthly budget reports are distributed by e-mail prior to monthly PTA meetings, presented and discussed at monthly PTA meetings, and are posted on the website. Reviewing our budget reports will provide all income and expenditure detail, and will eliminate the need to rely on the rumor mill.

The parents have made a commendable effort to fund this teaching staff position, but their contributions overall have not been sufficient to fund all budgeted line items. The staff positions funded by the PTA include two Cafeteria Aides, the Math Resource Teacher, and one Teacher Aide (Ms. Agoussi). In the school's staffing structure, Ms. Agoussi is the Aide in a class that serves nineteen students - yet all persons contributing funds since the start of the year have contributed to the cost of that position, while - as of the first week of February - only four of the families with children in that class had made Family Enrichment Fee contributions to the PTA treasury. While additional parents have now stepped up their donations, several of the contributions have been made on the condition that they be used only to continue the funding of Ms. Agoussi's position. Unless the PTA membership as a whole directs the Board to do "earmarked" receipt and expenditure of funds, we will expend the monies in a way that they provide value to as many students and families as possible.

If, as has been suggested, that there are those who would like to fund Ms. Agoussi's fees separately from the PTA, I do urge you to confer with Mrs. Miles, as the PTA's role in this staffing matter is only that of providing funds to pay the contractual services. Otherwise, this is a school staffing issue that the Principal will surely take measures to address.

PTA Treasurer Doug Noble and I agree, and we think other Board members agree, that we will recommend that the PTA not try to fund school staffing positions in future years, but we remain committed to funding the staff positions budgeted for this year, to the extent that income and cash flow allow.

Thank you for your continued support of Shepherd Elementary School.

# Shepherd IB-PYP Corner

### Update:

On Thursday and Friday of this week Shepherd ES will welcome our IB consultant, Ms. Mona Maruca. She was assigned by the IB Regional Office to provide guidance and coaching to our IB coordinator, principal, and teachers during the next year of our journey toward IB authorization.

Typically, the consultant visits the school for two consecutive days to observe classes and meet with groups of teachers, the coordinator and school head. This enables the consultant to become somewhat familiar with the school environment and culture and to find out what the challenges are. After the two-day visit, the consultant is available to the school staff to review documents, such as the Programme of Inquiry (POI), the unit planners and the Application Part B, and give constructive feedback. The consultant is also available by phone and e-mail to assist with trouble-shooting during trial implementation of the units. Shepherd teachers will implement their first unit of inquiry during the last six weeks of school.

Another important IB event this week was the visit of two Shepherd teachers, Ms. Kinsler (Grade 1) and Ms. Ulba (Grade 5), to the Washington International School (WIS). They were able to observe the PYP in action in a first and fifth grade classroom there. This experience should help them to understand how to implement a PYP unit in their own classroom.

### PYP Lesson of the Week: More on Reflection

Last week we looked at reflection by students through characterizing their learning experiences as "most challenging," "most helpful," etc. We pointed out that students are required to explain orally or in writing why they selected a particular characterization.

Reflection can be taken even further by having students reflect on the process of their learning. Students are asked to respond to prompts such as,

- I learned more quickly when I... (ex. showed someone else how to..., played a game, looked up information on my own, drew a diagram or chart, etc.)
- I remember information better when I...
- I organize my work best when I...

This type of reflection helps the student and the teacher discover the student's learning style (visual, auditory or tactile/ kinesthetic) and which of the multiple intelligences is dominant in that student. PYP students learn in the intermediate grades what the seven multiple intelligences are (visual/ spatial, verbal/linguistic, logical/mathematical, bodily/ kinesthetic, musical/rhythmic, interpersonal and intrapersonal).

Teachers should engage in this type of reflection as well.


### Questions for reflection and discussion:

How do you learn best? Do you know what your learning style is? Do you know what your child's learning style is? If you are not sure, observe and ask questions to figure this out, or visit this website to take a test (or help your child to take a test) to determine your/your child's learning style and dominant intelligence: www.ldpride.net/learningstyles.MI.htm

Discovering these things about your child can help you to help him or her more effectively with school work.

# **Literacy Corner**

### **Cut-Apart Stories**

A. Goal: To help your child build comprehension skills by arranging lines of text to form a story (Sequence).

B. What You Will Need:

- Paper
- Pencil or pen
- Scissors
- C. Let's Go!
  - Write a short story with your child and copy it onto a sheet of paper. Or rewrite a story you have read. Make sure your story has a beginning, middle, and an end.
  - 2. Draw a picture that goes with the story and attach it to the back.
  - 3. Cut the lines of the story apart.
  - 4. Place them into a large envelope or resealable plastic storage bag.
  - 5. Have your child take out the pieces and read them.
  - 6. Ask your child to arrange the lines of text to retell the story in the right order.
  - 7. Reread the story to check for accuracy. Turn the pieces over. They should make a picture if pieces are placed in the right order.

### Example:

Mother butterfly lays her eggs.

Caterpillars come out of the eggs.

Each caterpillar spins a chrysalis.

A butterfly comes out.

### **Record a Story**

A. Goal: To help your child read more fluently and with expression

B. What You Will Need:

- Story or short book
- Tape recorder
- Your best reading voice

### C. Let's Go!

- 1. Read your story together.
- 2. Help your child practice reading the story alone, using her/his best reading voice. Be sure to add expression and sound effects!
- 3. Help your child tape her/his reading on cassette.
- 4. Share it with another child.

Quick Tip: The single most important activity for building the knowledge required for eventual success in reading is reading aloud to children. When you choose books to read aloud, try reading books that are *just a little* beyond your child's understanding. This will encourage questions and cause your child to think.

# What's Happening in the Art Room?

Pre-K and Kindergarten students have been doing exciting things is the art room! They have made numbers and will be making letters of the alphabet using modeling clay. # Math Corner



### Primary Problems of the Week

Students in grades 3 - 6 must know how to analyze data and predict outcomes. You can begin helping your child prepare by doing simple data and probability problems at home.

### Example 1:

Place 5 marbles of the same color in a bag and 1 marble of another color in the same bag. Ask your child which color you would most likely choose and why. Explain probability.

### Example 2:

Give your child piece of turkey, a piece of ham, a slice of American cheese and a slice of Cheddar cheese. Work with your child to see how many different sandwich combination he/she can make. (Of course you can use paper cut-outs instead of real food.



### Intermediate Problems of the Week

The problems listed below are sample DC CAS/DC BAS test items.

### Standard of the Week:

Data Analysis and Probability (DASP).

### **Third Grade**

Students should be able to list and count the number of possible combinations of objects from 2 sets.

**3rd Grade Problem:** Using pictures of two shirts and three pairs of pants from a catalogue, how many different outfits can you make?



### Fourth Grade

Students will be able to represent the possible outcomes for a simple probability situation.

### 4th GradeProblem:

There are 5 red marbles, 6 blue marbles, and 2 green marbles in a bag. What is the probability that a red marble will be selected from the bag?



### **Fifth Grade**

Students will be able to define and apply the concepts of mean to solve problems.

### **5th Grade Problem:**

James recorded the number of points he scored in each basketball game for the first 6 games of the season. What is the average number of points James scored per game?



Game	Number of
Game 1	10
Game 2	6
Game 3	15
Game 4	9
Game 5	2
Game 6	14

### Sixth Grade

Students will be able to compute probabilities of events from simple experiments with equally likely outcomes (e.g., tossing dice, flipping coins, and spinning spinners) by listing all poscibilities and finding the fraction that

sibilities and finding the fraction that meets given conditions. They will be able to analyze the outcomes.

### 6th Grade Problem:

There are 5 pink, 4 purple, and 3 red candies in a bag. Without looking, Malcolm will choose one candy from the bag. What is the probability that Malcolm will choose a purple candy?

The funds raised through this fun and exciting event are very necessary to catch up on outstanding bills, pay teachers/salaries, and prepare us for the following year.

We are, at this time, making the request that every parent make a donation in the form of an item or service to the auction committee. You can do this as your own personal donation or solicit your employer and stores/service centers/ doctors/ etc. We challenge every parent to submit a <u>\*\*minimum\*\*</u> of two (2) items/services (one personal and one/some from a vendor). Some of these things may not even be of a monetary cost to you but rather a chunk of your time or re-gifting of an item that someone has given you but you have never used.

Additionally, you should make plans now to:

- immediate purchase your tickets for the auction (Tickets may be available for purchase as soon as next week.)
- reserve an entire table (You can do this today!)
- place an ad in the catalog
- accept a challenge to sell at least two (2) tickets to someone outside of the immediate Shepherd community.

As times are dire, this funding will serve multiple purposes: (1) allow for an operating budget for the auction committee and (2) also pay for some of our ongoing current expenditures. (i.e., contractual fees paid to school staff.) The sooner these funds are available to the PTA, the sooner the PTA can secure our children's needs.
