PARENTING TIP: 2

THE TIME-OUT BENCH

When children are losing control and seem on the verge of yelling, hitting, or losing their tempers, they need some enforced quiet time to regain their peace and think about alternatives to losing control. TRY THIS: Have a soft, "calm" chair or bench where a child must sit while calming down.



Help them to understand that their feelings of anger are not wrong – everyone gets angry sometimes. It is what they do when they are angry that gets them into trouble. If they can maintain a peaceful attitude, they are far more likely to solve their problem wisely.

Quick Tip for Literacy:

Next time you're baking, cleaning up, or sharing a meal with your child, play the "Tap & Say" game to help your child learn to listen to the number of syllables in a word.

Say a word to your child. Ask your child to tap the table for each syllable in the word.

Help Children Find and Enjoy the Poetic Side of Life – Part II

Haiku

A syllable is a part of a word pronounced as a unit. It is usually made up of a vowel alone or a vowel with one or more consonant. The word "syllable" has three syllables: syl-la-ble.

Haiku is an unrhymed traditional form of Japanese poetry. A Haiku consists of 3 lines with a 5-7-5 syllable pattern. Here is an example of Haiku poetry:

Green and speckled legs, Hop on logs and lily pads Splash in cool water.

Analyzing the Haiku:

How many syllables are in each line of the example? Use a / to separate each syllable.

Green and speckled legs,	Syllables
Hop on logs and lily pads	Syllables
Splash in cool water.	Syllables

What animal do you think the Haiku is describing?

Now write your own Haiku!

You can write on any topic that you'd like (sports, shopping, summer, animals, etc.) Remember: the first and last lines of a Haiku have 5 syllables and the middle line has 7 syllables. Share you Haiku with family, friends, and teachers.

The IB PYP Corner

Update, News and Notes:

- During the last two weeks Shepherd's classroom teachers have been putting the finishing touches on the written planner for their first PYP unit of inquiry. They are collaborating with the special subject teachers, who will support the "central idea" of the PYP units in their special subject classes. Each unit will focus on a particular attribute in the Learner Profile and on specific transdisciplinary skills. Special subject teachers will reinforce the Learner Profile and the skills as well. If some of the terms mentioned here are puzzling to you, go back to the IB PYP Corner in previous issues of *The Mustang* to review the descriptive information.
- All teachers will begin their first PYP unit of inquiry either during the week beginning May 11 or May 18. The unit will be three to five weeks long. In next week's article we will list for each grade level the theme, central idea, skills and Learner Profile attribute(s) for the unit. All teachers on the same grade level will implement the same PYP unit at the same time. We will also post this information on the IB bulletin board in the main hallway.
- By the way, the IB bulletin board has a new look this month and features the IB Learner Profile attributes in Spanish, English and French. Check it out!

PYP Lesson of the Week: THE PYP Planner

The "planner" that teachers are writing for their "unit of inquiry" is a lesson plan of sorts, but spans several weeks rather than one day or one lesson. The written planner has several parts and is typically four pages long.

On the first page there is a box for descriptive information such as school name, school code, grade level, teachers' names, title of the unit, length of the unit, etc. This box contains the IB official logo. To the left of this box is a box labeled, "1. What is our purpose?" Teacher enter the title of one of the six transdisciplinary themes here, along with the central idea of the unit and the final ("summative") assessment task that should show whether or not students developed a clear understanding of the central idea. Below the logo or title box is box 2, "What do we want to learn?" Teachers must enter here the three most important "key concepts" of the unit, the three to four lines of inquiry, and the key teacher questions that will kick off the unit and spark the curiosity of students about the central idea. A "teacher provocation" might be written here as well. This is a teacher -led activity or objects or centers placed in the classroom by the teacher to generate interest in the central idea and to stimulate student questioning.

There are three more boxes on the second page. Box 3, "How might we know what we have learned?" is a space for teachers to write in how they will assess students' prior knowledge about the central idea and how the teacher will check the progress of student learning over the course of

several days and weeks, as students work through the unit. These assessments are called "formative." Box 4, "How best might we learn?" provides a place for teachers to write in all of the learning activities that they plan to provide for students and how they will guide inquiry done by students. Teachers also list in this box the transdisciplinary skills and Learner Profile attributes that they will focus on in this unit and the related activities. Box 5, "What resources need to be gathered?" is the space for teachers to write in the books, videos, games and other materials they expect to use during the unit. They must also describe how the learning environment – the classroom – will be designed to support the inquiries for this unit. Related field trips are also listed in this box.

The remaining boxes 6 through 9 on the last two pages will be completed by teachers as the unit is in progress and at the end of the unit. These boxes are primarily for recording what learning did or did not take place during the unit and reflecting on how the unit went and what changes the teachers might make the next time they do this unit. The label for Box 6 is, "To what extent did we achieve our purpose?" The label for Box 7 is, "To what extent did we include the elements of the PYP?" In Box 8, "What student-initiated inquiries arose from the learning?" teachers must record the questions that students generated and the inquiries they came up with. Taking action based on new learning is an important part of the PYP. It is here that teachers record the actions that students took as a result of their new learning or new understandings from this unit. Box 9 is for any other notes teachers want to make.

Questions for reflection and discussion:

Do you ever introduce your child to a new experience or new idea and find that you child has a lot of questions about it or wants to find out more about it? If so, you are witnessing your child doing the PYP actions of generating questions and initiating inquiries. How can you support and extend those inquiries at home?

I know I was asked to put my name in for the LSRT because, in large part, of my commitment to both foreign languages at SES. Indeed, this was the most attractive feature that drew my boys to Shepherd, from a good DC charter school (where they attended pre-school). And, for pre-K and K, my boys have had good teaching, in English, French, and Spanish. But with the sudden principal change last October, and hearsay that SES parents lacked real enthusiasm for language, I began to wonder how the program came about. I couldn't find anything in writing, but I did discover the one body officially set to take up such matters: the LSRT.

When, I attended the December meeting, just after the foreign language classes were cut from 6 to 3 hours, I was surprised no one mentioned that there were many unhappy parents. (As a visitor, I could observe but not talk at that meeting.) At subsequent meetings I attended, there was a range of issues that might surprise parents—from safety concerns to lower grade testing with possible PTA funding, but often not fully discussed. I'd like to see our principal get a fair picture from the meetings of the views of all SES parents. And that means the LSRT has to be transparent: open and on the record. Meetings and agendas should be better publicized, fuller minutes (for all meetings) in the library, along with better reporting in the Mustang and PTA meetings. An annual survey of parents concerns would also be a good way to start the year. And, like other successful DC public schools, a website so that anyone can catch-up on the issues at anytime. (How many people can make a 3:30 pm Thursday meeting?)

This year, I did work with others to press and support the Saturday language program (a definite statement of parent support and the likely lynchpin to obtaining the 5 week free summer language camps). I've also worked on mundane issues of getting ink cartridges for the library copiers (we were really out of them); directing outside money to obtain French language books for our resource-short teacher; as well as helping direct money for one teacher's aid. (Losing that aid would probably mean sharing some or all of the other aids—or leaving a K teacher without an assistant.) Finally, I obtained what might be the only documented LSRT guidelines on the web (put on the Shepherd PTA site) with a commitment from DCPS to eventually update and locate it on their web.




May 17 Is the Date for Next **Auction Committee Meeting**
