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A Word from Mrs. Miles!

Greetings Everyone!

In last week's edition of *The Mustang*, I asked parents to begin thinking about next year and recommitting themselves to Shepherd ES I also stated that I would be sharing with you some of my thoughts about Shepherd and what I would like to see next year and beyond as we work to become rejuvenated, renewed and regenerated together. Last week I discuss volunteerism, this week we will focus on safety.

Kiss and Ride

Before the end of the year, I encourage you to park your car, stand on the sidewalk between 8:25 a.m. and 8:50 a.m. and tell me what you see. For those of you are will be unable to complete this task, let me share with you. In the mornings between this time you will find Jonquil packed with cars, you will see people making illegal U-turns, parents stopping in the middle of the street and letting students out, students jutting in between cars, students coming close to being hit, horns blaring and every now and then someone yelling out of the window. To state it candidly, it is a chaotic mess and a disaster waiting to happen. Therefore, before our morning scene turns tragic, something will be done.

Next year, we will be implementing (reinstating) the *Kiss and Ride* program. For those of you who do not know... the *Kiss and Ride* is a designated area (identified by signs) for parents picking up or unloading their children by private vehicle. For *Kiss and Ride* to be successfully implemented, we will need parents to adhere to the expectations. More information will be coming at the start of the year, but below are a few things to keep in mind:

- School staff members, parent volunteers, and student safety patrols provide supervision.
- Children load and unload from the passenger side of the car only, so they will not have to cross the street in front of traffic.
- Drivers remain in the car. Safety patrols will assist with the car door.
- Cars stay in a single file line as they move to and from the *Kiss and Ride*.
- Parents wanting to enter the school must park in an available parking space. They are not to enter the *Kiss and Ride* line.
- Arrive early. The busiest time at the *Kiss and Ride* area is five to ten minutes before the start of classes.

Counseling Corner

Parenting Tip #3: Monitoring the TV

Children learn a great deal about human relations and how people get along by



watching the television. Most parents whose children watch television will know about X-Men, Power Rangers and other aggressive "Might makes Right" characters that children want to emulate. Some parents do not allow children to watch violent children's shows on TV that would certainly be the first line of defense in helping your child become a peace-loving adult. Other parents may feel that their children will watch the shows at friends' houses anyway, so why not use the shows to teach some lessons?

TRY THIS: Videotape one of your children's shows so that you can stop it at any time and not miss the action. Pause at places where other methods for resolving the problems could be tried. Discuss with your child the alternatives to violent action and why these would be preferred in our everyday interactions with others. 2nd TIP; Have your child to write a constructed response regarding the discussion you had for alternative methods for resolving conflicts.

Intermediate Grades

Diamante

A Diamante is a seven-lined unrhymed poem that appears in a diamond shape. Here's the formula for writing a Diamante:

- Line 1: Noun that is the subject of the poem
- Line 2: Two adjectives describing the noun
- Line 3: Three verbs: -ing, -ed, -s words that relate to the subject
- Line 4: Four nouns: two nouns relate to line 1 and two nouns relate to line 7
- Line 5: Three verbs: -ing, -ed, -s words that relate to the subject
- Line 6: Two adjectives describing the noun in line 7
- Line 7: Noun, contrasting or opposite of the noun in line 1

Analyze the above poem. Examine each line and compare it to the formula. Now write you own and have fun with it. Explore subjects such as nature, sports, or even school. Get creative by adding a border of illustrations.

Update, News and Notes:

Here is the basic information about the "unit of inquiry" that each grade level is working on this month through the first few days of June. Remember, all teachers on the same grade level are doing the same unit of inquiry.

PYP Lesson of the Week: "Action" in the PYP

Last Thursday, May 14, one of the hosts of the "Today" show on NBC interviewed a five-year-old boy who started his own television cooking show. The five-year-old, Julian, said that he had watched cooking shows on the air and simply decided that he wanted to do his own. His parents function as the directors of the show, but Julian does the demonstrating and cooking.

On the same day, the *District* section of *The Washington Post* featured a front page photograph and article on page 3 about a group of students at Horace Mann Elementary who won a first place award for outstanding work in a program called Saving Energy in DC Schools. This is an initiative by the DC Alliance to Save Energy and the DC Department of the Environment. The article explains, "Sixth-graders at Mann collected data on temperature, light levels and wattage of appliances and calculated cost of electricity per classroom. Students alerted the principal of their findings and shared them during the school's Earth Day celebration." Based on the information they gathered, they also gave the principal recommendations on how energy could be conserved at the school.

Both of these stories are excellent examples of one of the five "essential elements" of the PYP – **ACTION**. Action is explained in the IB document, *Making the PYP Happen*:

In the PYP, it is believed that education must extend beyond the intellectual to include not only socially responsible attitudes but also thoughtful and appropriate action. An explicit expectation of the PYP is that successful inquiry will lead to responsible action, initiated by the student as a result of the learning process.

This action will extend the student's learning, or it may have a wider social impact, and will clearly look different within each age range. PYP schools can and should meet the challenge of offering all learners the opportunity and the power to choose to act; to decide on their actions; and to reflect on these actions in order to make a difference in and to the world... Action should be seen as a voluntary demonstration of a student's empowerment in the context of the expectations laid down in the programme....In the PYP it is believed that not only is it possible for students to identify appropriate action, but also that teachers have a responsibility to enable them to choose their action carefully, to facilitate this action, and to encourage them to reflect on the action they undertake. This is viewed as an important part of students' active participation in their own learning...Action as a result of the learning may not be witnessed by the teacher and often happens beyond the classroom.

Reflection question: Have you ever observed your child

taking a voluntary action at home based on some new knowledge acquired? If so, that's PYP action!
