Neighborhood Library Doings

The Black Voices Book Club at the Shepherd Park Library will meet at 7:30 p.m. Monday, Oct. 19, to discuss Chris Abani's novel "Graceland." A few copies are available to check out, meaning there's still plenty of time to read it, so come to the library, 7420 Georgia Avenue. It's free!

A monthly Afternoon Book club meets at 1 p.m. The next gathering will be Tuesday, Nov. 10.

Also, there is a weekly seminar and discussion series on all aspects of the African-American experience, "African American Lives & History," at noon Tuesdays. Each week focuses on a particular person, event or theme and will incorporate audiovisual materials.

For a limited time, the Shepherd Park Library has Amharic-language books available for checkout. If you know any Amharic speakers, please let them know. This is an experiment, and if they don't get used, they'll be sent back downtown to the central library.

The library is also taking names and contact information for free English as a Second Language classes to start later this month. The classes will be divided into as many as three skill levels. Go to the information desk of the library to register for the free ESL classes. The Juanita E. Thornton-Shepherd Park Library has preschool story time for ages 3-5 every Tuesday at 10 a.m., followed by baby/toddler lap time at 11 a.m. for children ages birth through 24 months. Preschool movies for children ages 3-5 are shown at the library at 10:30 a.m. Thursday.

And on Saturdays the D.C. Public Library system's best Scrabble Club meets at 1 p.m. School-age children and adults are welcome to come and play.



There Is No Substitute for a Caring Teacher

Mrs. Kendall took a lot of heat in the fall of 1977. One in a series of substitute teachers in my fourth grade class at New Franklin Elementary School in Portsmouth, N.H., Mrs. Kendall endured a daily barrage of eye-rolling, paper airplanes and infantile outbursts from me and my classmates for two solid weeks.

Tutored by the antics of "The Sweathogs," from the television classic "Welcome Back Kotter," we thought we were pretty clever back then and certainly no substitute was any match for us.

Boy, were we wrong. About a month later, Mrs. Kendall returned as our permanent teacher. "Welcome back, welcome back, welcome back..."

While we were determined to drive her away, she was just as determined to be our teacher, even more so. She set the tone early, kept us focused and guided us through a challenging year. The week before school let out, she rewarded us for our hard work by taking the class to a play at the University of New Hampshire -- the first stage production most of us had ever seen.

I wouldn't learn until more than a decade later how hard she had it that year. I worked with her son at a state park in coastal New Hampshire. He recognized my name right away. "You were in my mom's class," he said, his voice sounding both defensive and protective. "She talked about you a lot." I figured it wasn't good and he confirmed my suspicions with stories from her perspective in the classroom those first two weeks.

But I wouldn't truly understand until this month how difficult her job actually was. For the past two weeks I have been serving as a substitute teacher in D.C. Public Schools with the goal of entering a master's degree program to become a full-time educator and follow in my parents' footsteps.


I had my first gig Oct. 2 at Shepherd Elementary School. Third grade. While my experience was nothing like Mrs. Kendall's, it was a challenge; one that made me respect and admire our teachers even more than I had

But it was also incredibly rewarding and made me realize why Mrs. Kendall came back. Something happens to you -- something so profound it can't be put into words -- when you help a child learn, when you see that child solve a problem independently, when you see that child exhibit leadership and guide a classmate struggling with the same problem. You get a sense that -- as teacher, astronaut and fellow Granite State resident Christa McAuliffe once said -- "I touch the future."

Looking back at Mrs. Kendall's class, I can count two doctors, three teachers, a handful of successful businessmen, and at least one former journalist who hopes to make as much of an impact on the future as she did more than 30 years ago.

I want to thank the third-grade students of Shepherd Elementary School for helping me learn something important about life. I know I saw the leaders of tomorrow in the smart, enthusiastic and bright-eyed children I met in that classroom on Oct. 2.

Student's-Eye View

At Shepherd Elementary, we have a beforeand after-care program called Star Achievers. Most of the activities happen after school. Star Achievers can participate in ballet, martial arts, Spanish lessons, learning to play the guitar, life skills, art projects and tutoring.

Fourth-grade girls talk with Ms. Liggins, the counselor, about "girl things." In Ms. Liggins' class, she has the "respect ball," so that the girls show respect to each other. We can only talk when we are holding the ball. After we finish talking, we can pass it to another person or give it back to Ms. Liggins.

Pre-kindergarten girls take ballet. The ballet teacher is Ms. Johnson. Ms. Johnson is working on basic ballet steps with the girls.

In Spanish, fourth-grade boys and girls read in that language. In guitar class, students have learned seven different notes and how to play them on the guitar.

Mr. Thornton, a parent of a past Shepherd student, is the martial arts teacher.

Although Shepherd has all of these fun activities in after-care, students still have to do their homework. (What's a kid to do?...)
