A Word from Mrs. Miles!

Greetings!

Sunday evening at 6 p.m., I will send out an Emergency Test Message via the ConnectEd phone messaging system. The purpose of my call will be to make sure the number we have on file for you is correct. If you do not receive a call, please update your information by visiting our school's Web site and completing the form. You may send a hard copy to school with your student or an electronic copy to Mrs. Brooks at robbynabrooks@dc.gov.

Last Thursday, we experienced a power failure. In this type of emergency the situation is assessed and a decision is made to: dismiss school early, move the students to a remote site (Tifereth Israel Synagogue or Takoma Elementary). In all events, parents will be notified by a ConnectEd message followed by a phone call from your child's teacher. Please know during these events our main phone lines have no service. However, we are connected to the outside world via my DCPS administered cell phone. When a situation is assessed: time, temperature and overall safety of students are taken into consideration.

All other emergencies that occur when school is not in session (inclement weather, flood, fire, flu outbreak, for example) that may result in a delayed start to the school day or school closure will be communicated via ConnectEd, the school listserv, Shepherd Web site, DCPS Web site and local media outlets.

Sign-in and Sign-out

All visitors, including parents, must sign-in, get a visitor badge and check in with the front office prior to proceeding to class. Parents should not proceed through the auditorium at arrival time and at dismissal time to their child's classroom. The main entrance is the only entrance for non-school employees. Next week, staff members will be on duty, stopping parents who are attempting to access the main building via the gymnasium. Please be respectful and courteous to individuals.

Impact Aid

This week, you received Impact Aid applications. If you have not done so, please complete and return your form no later than Monday, Oct. 26. The first class with a 100 percent return rate will receive a pizza party. All classes with a 100 percent return rate by Wednesday, Oct. 28, will receive a Two Day No Uniform pass. Students get two days to dress in their favorite outfits versus the school uniform.

What We've Been Learning in Physical Education Class

This past week, pre-K has learned the following: Toss and catch a large ball before it bounces twice. Throw a ball toward an object. Use knowledge about objects' attributes to manipulate them. Essential question: What sports require you to both catch a ball and throw it at a target?

The week prior, pre-K learned to kick a ball that is stationary from a standstill position. Essential question: What sports require you to kick a ball?

This past week, kindergarten demonstrated hand-eye or hand-foot coordination when striking a ball, stationary or moving. Essential question: What sports require good hand-eye, or hand-foot coordination?

The week before, kindergartners met the following objective: Demonstrate the relationship of over/under, behind/in front of/next to, right/left, up/down, forward/backward by using their body and objects on the playground. Essential question: How can relationships between body parts and objects affect activity?

This past week, first-graders learned how to dribble a ball in a forward direction using the instep while increasing speed. They sought to answer the essential question: Why do you want to dribble a ball going forward?

The week prior, first-graders dribbled a ball in a forward direction using the instep and answered the essential question: In what sport do you dribble a ball with your feet?

This past week, second-graders demonstrated teamwork skills without interfering with others and sought to answer the essential question: How may teamwork help us in classroom activities?

The week prior, they dribbled a ball in a forward direction with control using the instep and sought to answer the essential question: In what sport do we dribble a ball with our feet?

This past week, third-graders dribbled a ball while increasing speed and changing direction, while trying to answer the essential question: How is dribbling a ball moving forward different than dribbling a ball while changing direction?

The week prior, they kicked a ball to a partner using the instep and kicked the ball while changing direction and identify the differences between dribbling the ball while moving forward and when changing direction. They answered the essential question: Why may we need to change direction while dribbling a ball?

In the past two weeks, fourth-graders kicked a ball to a partner and kicked a ball from a stationary spot into the air. Dribble a ball while keeping it away from a defensive player, and tell how it differs from dribbling a ball without a defender. They answered the essential question: What are some of the differences between dribbling a ball with a defender and dribbling a ball without one?

In the past two weeks, fifth-graders punted a ball dropped from the hands at a target, trapped a kicked ball, dribbled a ball and kick a ball toward a goal while being guarded. They sought to answer the essential question: What are the similarities and differences between putting and kicking a ball?

and therefore tax-exempt, property and (2) costs incurred due to "federally connected" students, such as the children of armed services personnel working at a nearby military base. Unlike most other forms of educational assistance, Impact Aid disburses roughly \$1.3 billion annually in unrestricted federal funds directly to local school districts rather than through state agencies.

Stop the Blame Game

"I didn't do it!" My 7-year-old daughter, Coco, recites that phrase like a mantra. Her explanations for why she's blameless fall into three main categories: Someone hit her first, it was the other kid's idea, or some adult (usually me) was responsible.

I used to let these comments slide, figuring every child her age blames others when something goes wrong. But when she said, "I didn't break the cup -- my hand did," I knew I had to teach her to own up to her behavior.

"Kids this age have difficulty taking responsibility for their actions and behavior, especially when they think their parents would disapprove of something they did," says Jeanne Brooks-Gunn, PhD, professor of child development at Columbia University Teachers College, in New York City. Since they are still not adept at anticipating consequences, admitting culpability can be daunting. For school-age children, understanding rules and consequences is still a developmental work in progress, says K. Mark Sossin, PhD, professor of psychology at Pace University, in New York City.

Even if you know why your child is reluctant to admit that she's done something wrong, you may be baffled by the strange things she says when confronted with something that's obviously her doing. Keep in mind that, for most children, accepting responsibility is a learned behavior, like manners or taking turns. So the next time you run into one of the following situations, use it as an opportunity to teach her how to react appropriately.

Students Take a Stand for Music Legend

More than 120 Shepherd Elementary School students recently wrote letters to Ben Hall, director of music in D.C. Public Schools, urging that Paul Robeson be included in DCPS music textbooks.

Paul Robeson is not mentioned in any editions of "Making Music," by Silver Burdett (Scott Foreman 2002), now used by DCPS.

Mr. Robeson was born in 1898. He attended Rutgers University and graduated as class valedictorian in 1919. He earned his law degree from Columbia Law School in New York City in 1923. Mr. Robeson later went to live in Europe where he improved his singing and acting abilities. He was in the play "Othello" that led to even more fame. By the 1930s, he had become very active and outspoken against racism in the United States and around the world.

In her letter, Mattie Melnyk, a Shepherd third-grader wrote, "We have been learning about Paul Robeson for a long time. I think we should have him in our music textbooks because he was a very important musician."

Mr. Robeson was known for his deep and powerful voice and singing "Old Man River" and the "Ballad for Americans." In January 2004, long after his death in 1976, Paul Robeson's image was placed on a U.S. postage stamp to honor him as "a man who symbolized excellence."

"And if they made a stamp about him, why can't we have him in our textbooks?" Melnyk concluded in her letter. "I think our music teacher was right to want him in our textbooks."

Students await a response to their letters that were written in the class of school music instructor Ken Giles.

DC Transit Recommendations Open House in Ward 4

The District Department of Transportation will hold an open house for all Ward 4 residents Tuesday, Oct. 27, from 7-8:30 p.m. at Brightwood Elementary School, 1300 Nicholson St. NW to engage residents and businesses in the implementation of improvements proposed for the transit system for the city, including streetcars.

DDOT will present the findings of the DC's Transit Future study. DC's Transit Future studied short-term and long-term surface transit improvements for the District, which potentially could include additional limited-stop bus services, bus rapid transit and streetcar services. The open houses will focus on DDOT's proposed streetcar network.

DDOT initiated the study in 2004 as a joint effort with the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority. It included a comprehensive public outreach program and a multi-corridor Alternatives Analysis that evaluated modes of transportation (bus and streetcar) and an implementation schedule for transit improvements in the District.

DDOT has already initiated construction on two streetcar lines, and the open house will give residents an opportunity to hear about the current progress and view updated plans for future streetcar lines and other exciting transportation investments across the District.

- **Tuesday, Nov. 10, 5-8 p.m.**

These vaccinations are only for children and young people from the age of 6 months to 24 years.
