Remembering Veterans

Many people confuse Memorial Day and Veterans Day. Both holidays were established to recognize and honor the men and women who have worn the uniform of the United States Armed Forces. Memorial Day, which is observed on the last Monday in May, is set aside as a day for remembering and honoring military personnel who died in the service of their country, particularly those who died in battle or as a result of wounds sustained in battle

While those who died are also remembered on Veterans Day, which is observed on November 11, Veterans Day is intended to thank and honor all those who served honorably in the military - in wartime or peacetime. In fact, Veterans Day is largely intended to thank living veterans for their service, to acknowledge that their contributions to our national security are appreciated, and to underscore the fact that all those who served, not only those who died, have sacrificed and done their duty.

Traffic Woes

The morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up times can sometimes be chaotic. In order to keep all children safe, we ask that you please remember the following:

- Parents may drop off students from 8:20 to 8:40 AM. Parent pick-up starts at 3:10 PM.
- If you are dropping off or picking up via the carpool line, cars should line up along the 14th street sidewalk closet to the school.

- Please do NOT drop off your child in the middle of the street for this can be quite dangerous.
- Please have your child ready to leave the car when you approach the sidewalk. If each child has his or her own backpack and lunchbox ready, drop off can be more efficient
- Please stay in your car! Individuals on duty are ready and able to assist as needed.
- Be sure your child exits or enters the car from the passenger side so he/she only walks on the sidewalk, not in the road.
- Please do not talk on your cell phones while moving during transition times. We need your undivided attention to your driving to keep everyone safe!
- If you choose to come into the school, be sure to turn off your engine and park anywhere besides the carpool line.

Be patient! Our staff members do their best to keep the system efficient. They are outside in all sorts of weather and keep smiling.

Afternoon Dismissal

We do not dismiss from the office between 3:00 pm and 3:30 pm. If you have an appointment, we ask that you arrive at school before 3:00 pm. Students who are not picked up by 3:00 pm will be dismissed at 3:10 or 3:15 and will be in one of three places: carpool line, gymnasium or the cafeteria. If your student normally goes to aftercare, they will be in the cafeteria. If you need to pick your student up from after care between 3:00 and 3:30, please sign-in, retrieve a visitor's badge and report to the cafeteria to pick up your student.

Report Cards

Friday, November 13, 2009 is report card day! Report cards will be sent home with all students on this day. The first District-wide parent teacher conference day is scheduled for December 7, 2009. However, if you would like to meet with your student's teacher before this date, please contact them to schedule a conference.

Language Grades

Language teachers will not be giving individual grades for the first advisory. However, according to our language teachers our students are advancing and are doing extremely well. If you would like to discuss your child's language progress, please contact his/her language teacher.

H1N1

The school has taken several precautionary measures to prevent the spread of the flu in our school. We ask that parents help us prevent the spread of flu by doing the following:

* Teach your children to wash their hands often with soap and water or an alcohol-based hand rub. You can set a good example by doing this yourself.

- * Teach your children to cover their coughs and sneezes with tissues or with their elbows when a tissue is unavailable.
- * Teach your children not to share personal items like drinks, food or unwashed utensils.
- * Know the signs and symptoms of the flu. Symptoms of the flu include fever (100 degrees Fahrenheit/37.8 degrees Celsius or greater), cough, sore throat, a runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, and feeling very tired. Some people may also vomit or have diarrhea.
- * Keep sick children at home for at least 24 hours after they no longer have fever or do not have signs of fever, without using fever-reducing drugs. Keeping children with a fever at home will reduce the number of people who may get infected.
- * Do not send children to school if they are sick. Any children who are determined to be sick while at school will be sent home.

Get your student vaccinated at one of the H1N1 vaccination clinics. Clinics are held at District schools throughout the month of November. The schedule is on page 7.

How Do Children Learn the Words They Know?

- Use of varied vocabulary during meal times.
- Intellectually challenging conversation.
- Rich curriculum in school.
- Dialogic reading in school.
- Home book reading time.



How Many Words Do Children Know?

Children need to learn 2,000 to 3,000 new words each year from third grade onward, about 6-8 per day.

In first and second grade, children need to learn more than 800 words per year, about 2 per day.

Children who are behind by first grade have a hard time making up the gap.

At home, ask your child:

- What new word have you learned today?
- What is the definition of the word?
- Draw a picture of the word.
- What is a synonym (same meaning) for the word?

More Good News About Cell Phone Recycling



If you bring the cell phones and smartphones you don't use or need anymore to Shepherd, someone will actually pay for them, then recycle them so that their vital components can be reused without harming the environment.

Since GRC Recycling in Miramar, Fla., started its cell phone recycling program in 2002, more than \$6 million has been contributed to groups sponsoring used cell phone collection drives.

The Shepherd PTA collects cell phones and smartphones. (There are more than 100 million cell phones no longer in use throughout the United States.) Once collected, the phones are shipped to CRC for recycling. The PTA pays nothing for shipping. GRC pays from 50 cents to \$30 per phone, depending on make and model. Newer models may earn even more than \$30. Damaged and outdated phones will earn at least 50 cents. GRC pays for all phones. GRC then processes the phones through a zero-landfill, environmentally responsible recycling process. GRC also prepares an itemized listing of phone models submitted by the PTA, plus pricing for those phones. To learn more, visit GRC's Web site at www.grcrecycling.com.

At Shepherd Elementary School, there is a new student group called the Pay It Forward Club.

Club members meet Friday afternoons in the school library. In the first meeting, held recently, club members watched the movie, "Pay It Forward," which is about a boy in the seventh-grade and his "pay it forward" story.

One More Chance to Get Swine Flu Shots

Swine Flu Vaccinations Start Saturday in Ward 4

If you want to immunize your child from the H1N1 flu virus, commonly known as swine flu, you have one more chance in Ward 4 to do so, at Coolidge High School, 6315 Fifth St. NW near the intersection of Blair Road NW and Kansas Avenue NW. The date is Tuesday, Nov. 10, 5-8 p.m. These vaccinations are only for children and young people from age 6 months to 24 years.

Vaccinations will be given in the Frank Williams Activities Building, which is the large white/gray building at the north end of the Coolidge complex. Park around Fifth and Tuckerman Streets NW and enter from the Fifth Street side through the breezeway. Based on the experience of one D.C. parent, street parking may be easier than trying to get into the parking lot that you enter from Sheridan - it can be very congested due to school events.

While the District of Columbia's Department of Health will host vaccination clinics for school-aged children, many pediatricians, family physicians, community heath clinics and pharmacies have signed up to provide the vaccine as well. Parents and guardians should call their child's doctor to see if they are providing the vaccine. If your doctor is providing the vaccine, you may schedule an appointment to receive it there if it proves more convenient.

The supply of H1N1 vaccine will continue to increase throughout flu season, and there should eventually be enough vaccine for everyone in the District who wants it. The D.C. Department of Health continues to monitor infection rates in schools and across the District as colder weather approaches and will keep D.C. residents informed when new information on H1N1 becomes available. H1N1 Q and A:

What You Really Need to Know

Q: Is there more than one flu shot this year?

ANSWER: Yes - This year, there will be two flu shots: a seasonal flu vaccine and a vaccine against the H1N1 (swine flu) virus. This seasonal flu shot is already available as an injection and as a nasal spray. The H1N1 flu vaccine has only recently been made available. However, most of the available H1N1 vaccine will be the injectable form. Neither of the H1N1 vaccines contains the preservative thimerosol.

Q: Who should get the H1N1 flu shot?

ANSWER: Pregnant women, people who live with or care for infants younger than 6 months; health care workers; people between 6 months and 24 years of age; and people between 25 and 64 years of age who have a chronic medical condition should get the shot.

Q: Can I get both flu shots on the same day?

ANSWER: The injectable forms of the seasonal and H1N1 flu shots can be given on the same day if they are injected in separate sites (such as one in each shoulder). The nasal sprays cannot be given on the same day.

Q: How else can I protect my family against the flu?

ANSWER: Help limit the spread of infection from one person to another. Wash your hands frequently. When you sneeze or cough, cover your mouth and nose with your arm or shoulder. If you have a fever, stay home until your fever has been gone for at least 24 hours.

Action Steps to Protect Children and Families From Effects of Flu

Here are steps from the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to prepare for flu during the 2009-10 school year.

- Plan for child care at home if your child gets sick or school is dismissed.
- Plan to monitor the health of the sick child and any other children in the household by checking for fever and other symptoms of flu.
- •Identify if you have children who are at higher risk of serious disease from the flu and talk to your health care provider about a plan to protect them during flu season. Children at high risk of serious disease from the flu include children age 5 and those children with chronic medical conditions such as asthma and diabetes.
- Also identify a separate room in the house for the care of sick family members.
- Update emergency contact lists.
- Collect games, books, DVD and other items to keep your family entertained if schools are dismissed or your child is sick and must stay home.
- Talk to school administrators about their emergency plan.

If flu conditions become more severe, parents should consider the following steps:

- Extend the time sick children stay home for at least seven days, even if they feel better sooner. People who are still sick after even days should continue to stay home until at last 24 hours after symptoms. have completely gone away.
- •If a household member is sick, keep any school-age brothers or sisters home for five days from the time the household member became sick. Parents should monitor their health and the health of other school-aged children for fever and other symptoms of the flu.

Swimming Classes at Takoma Aquatic Center



A new session of Learn to Swim Classes for children ages 5-11 starts the week of Nov. 9 at the Takoma Aquatic Center, 300 Van Buren St. NW.

The Level 1 class, which started Nov. 2 and ends Nov. 25, helps students to feel comfortable in the water while developing basic swimming at water safety skills. Level 2 lessons builds on the skills offered in Level 1 through additional guided practice. You have to be able to show you've mastered Level 1 skills to get into this class, which ends Dec. 2. These classes are free to D.C. residents.

Likewise, you have to have the "exit skills" for Level 2 to get into Level 3, which enhances swimming skills and build on students know already through guided practice. This class ends Dec. 2. The Level 4 class gives additional guided practice and instruction. It, too, ends Dec. 2 and both costs \$30 each.

A parent-and-child learn-to-swim class had its first meeting Nov. 4 and continues through Nov. 27. It builds swimming readiness for children ages 6 mos. to 23 mos. by emphasizing fun in the water.

Parents and their children will learn basic skills: bubble blowing, front kicking, back floating and underwater exploration. This class costs \$30. A second parent-and-child class is tailored for children ages 6-12 months and costs \$30.

There are also three learn-to-swim classes for adults with varying degrees of swimming skills! For details, call the Takoma Aquatic Center at 576-9284.

It's Not Too Late to Opt In

Veterans Day Is Next Wednesday

Shepherd Elementary, like the rest of the D.C. Public Schools, and much of the District and federal government, will be closed next Wednesday, Nov. 11, for the observance of Veterans Day.

What we know now as Veterans Day was originally Armistice Day, to celebrate the signing of the peace treaty that ended the "Great War" (now known as World War I). Germany signed the peace treaty on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of the year.

Some nations still call it Armistice Day, while others call it Remembrance Day.

First observed in the United States in 1926, a Kansas shopkeeper in 1953 wanted to expand those recognized on the holiday to all who served in the U.S. armed forces at all times. His idea grew quickly in popularity, so much so that President Dwight Eisenhower signed a bill in May 1954 to recognize all veterans as the focus of the holiday. On Nov. 8, 1954, Congress voted to change the name, and it has been recognized as Veterans Day ever since.


