

'EARLY READER' VOLUNTEERS STILL NEEDED

Shepherd Elementary needs more volunteers to help students in its "Early Readers" program that takes place weekday mornings at 8 a.m. at the school.

Mrs. Miles, the principal, has said that some children have had to be turned away because there are more students than there are volunteers to help them. In other instances, the volunteers take in students even though there is a smaller chance of being effective with a larger group, but nobody wants to be Scrooge-like and turn them away.

Considering that there are parents who are willing to get their children to school at 8 a.m. -- 45 minutes before the school day officially begins -- so that they can master reading techniques speaks well for both parent and child. But we need more adults willing to step up and help these children.

If you're uncertain what skills you need for this volunteer duty, don't worry. Mrs. Miles will spend an hour with you to give you what you need to know. But the caring presence comes first.

Literacy Corner

VOCabulary refers to the storehouse of word meanings that we draw on to comprehend what is said to us, express our thoughts, or interpret what we read.

Idioms are phrases that mean more than their words put together. If you take them word for word, they might not make much sense! Idioms are a little like puz-

zles: try imagining a picture or a situation that the phrase suggests, and guess at the meaning from there.

Read the list of idioms below with your child. After reading the phrase in bold print, see if your child understands the meaning? Let the fun continue by creating an illustration of the idiom together!

Footing the bill

"paying."

The person who signs his or her name at the bottom, or "foot," of a bill or check (as at a restaurant) is the one who pays. Signing the foot, or "footing it," has come to mean paying.

The jig is up

"the game or trick is exposed."

In Shakespeare's time, "jig" was a slang for trick. When the "jig is up," the trick has been discovered.

The nick of time

"just before time is up."

Years ago, the scores of some games (like soccer) were kept by cutting notches or "nicks" in each end of a wooden "tally stick." A winning goal that came just before the clock ran out was said to be a "nick in time."

Bite off more than you can chew

"take on more than one can handle." Take a big bite out of a sandwich so that some of it is still sticking out past your lips. Now try chewing. Don't you wish you had bitten off less?
