DC BAS and Lower Grade Assessment

On January 12-13, students in first and second grades will be participating in a benchmark assessment. This assessment is not a part of the mandated District assessments. It is however, another tool we can

use to make sure we are meeting the needs of our students. The assessment results will provide us with information

on how our students are progressing in reading and math and will help us make more informed data driven decisions about your child's education.

Students will be assessed twice this year, once in January and again at the end of the year.

Please make sure your child gets plenty of rest during the testing period, eats breakfast and arrives to school everyday on time. Students in grades three through five will be assessing during this time period as well so your cooperation will help us create a positive and conducive test environment for all students.

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Literacy Corner

Happy New Year! Our focus for the month is fluency. Fluency is the ability to read text accurately and quickly. Fluency bridges word decoding and comprehension. Comprehension is understanding what has been read. Fluency is a set of skills that allows readers to rapidly decode text while maintaining high comprehension.

Here is a list of strategies you can use at home to help your child become a more fluent reader:

Provide children with opportunities to read and reread a range of stories and informational texts by reading on their own, partner reading, or choral reading.

Introduce new or difficult words to children, and provide practice reading these words before they read on their own.

Include opportunities for children to hear a range of texts read fluently and with expression.

Encourage periodic timing of children's oral reading and recording of information about individual children's reading rate and accuracy.

Model fluent reading, and then have students reread the text on their own.

For student success, it is important for children to read text that is on their reading level. Please see your child's teacher or our school librarian, Ms. Scinto, for ideas and suggestions of text that is

appropriate for their reading level.

Which Language Is Best for My Child?

Spanish today. French tomorrow?

Fortunately, parents who are trying to decide what second language would be best for their child aren't limited to just one.

Children are perfectly capable of learning more than one language, and even of learning multiple languages simultaneously. There is absolutely nothing hardwired into the brain that prevents children from learning more than one secondary language, or from learning more than one language at a time. It is also important to note that a child's capacity to learn more than one language simultaneously isn't something children have to grow into; they can begin their exploration of language (s) very early, and often with amazing results. In fact, the earlier they start, the longer and richer their exposure will be to the language or languages, and the deeper the effect will be.

"It is a joy to be able to help other people because that's what God wants us to do," said program volunteer Barbara Grant.

School's Paul Robeson Campaign Collects More Media Attention

The Northwest Current, which is circulated and distributed free in the neighborhood surrounding Shepherd Elementary and over much of Ward 4, has published its own story on the campaign to get Paul Robeson included in the next music textbook purchased by D.C. Public School. Here is the story, written by staff writer Jessica Gould and published in the Dec. 30 issue:

Students at Shepherd sing out for change By JESSICA GOULD Current Staff Writer

At Shepherd Elementary School, music instructor Ken Giles is teaching his students to be the instruments of change.

For the past two years, Giles' students have been on a campaign to make sure their next music textbooks include information about African-American singer, actor and activist Paul Robeson.

"We have been sending letters and learning about Paul Robeson for a long time," said Mattie Melnyk, a Shepherd third-grader. "I think we should have him in our music textbooks because he was a very important musician."

["]I really want Paul Robeson in our music textbooks because he was a good person who was a fighter for what he stood for," added fourth-grader Autumn Parrish. "Paul Robeson was an activist for peace and human rights."

Giles said he's been a fan of Robeson since he was a kid. "From childhood, I heard his music and heard his big bass voice, and I knew about his civil rights activ-ism."

He said he's particularly fond of Robeson's rendition of "Old Man River," from the musical "Show Boat." And he's drawn to the musician's life story.

For example, he said, Robeson broke boundaries in American theater as the first African-American to play Othello, and helped introduce a broader audience to African-American folk music and spirituals.

Meanwhile, he said, Robeson was an advocate for peace and equality who spoke out against Jim Crow, colonialism and war - even though his activism, and his socialist leanings, often made him the target of anticommunist campaigns.

"I knew that he had gotten in trouble with the U.S. government in the 1950s over his activism, and for a while, his passport was taken away. Then he won a Supreme Court case and he was given his passport back," Giles said.

The D.C. Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR), in coordination with the District of Columbia Public Schools (DCPS), offers DPR Play Day, a full day of programs for DCPS students in grades K-8 throughout the District. The intersection of music and activism resonates with Giles, who was a member of the '70s and '80s activist/ folk group Bright Morning Star. Teaching is his second career, something he took up after retiring from a job with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission.

When he arrived at Shepherd five years ago, Giles knew he wanted to introduce his students to Robeson. "I wanted to share that story,

because it's a very inspirational story about a musician who becomes an activist," he said.

But while the school's music textbook, by publisher Silver Burdett, includes a lot of interesting tidbits about important figures in American music, Giles said it doesn't mention Robeson once.

"So I created a little lesson including some of Paul Robeson's songs, showing some video clips that I have, and every year I've been teaching students about Paul Robeson," he said. "And then I realized, of course, that students who didn't have a music teacher who wanted to teach them about Robeson wouldn't find out about him."

Last year, Giles' students wrote letters to the director of music for D.C. Public Schools asking that Robeson be included in their next music textbook. This year, they did the same thing, sending 120 letters to the school system's central office.

In November, when Ben Hall, a supervisor with D.C. Public Schools, visited the school, students read him their letters and serenaded him with a version of Robeson's trademark "Old Man River."

According to Giles, Hall responded with great news. He said he would make Robeson's inclusion a condition in the selection of the next music textbook.

In an e-mail, D.C. Public Schools spokesperson Jennifer Calloway said the school system seeks textbooks "that provide a rich array of content that supports the teaching of the DC learning standards, including - in music - profiling individuals such as Paul Robeson as well as notable artists associated with the District."

In the meantime, Giles said, "here at Shepherd School, our students have learned his songs, learned about his social activism and learned that there can be consequences if you become an activist, but eventually our society does the right thing."

Third-grader Melnyk said she's appreciated the lessons. "I think it's really great that he's been teaching us so much about him, even though he's not in our textbooks," she said. "Because we've gotten an extra education for the past few years, all because of him teaching us about Paul Robeson."
