FROM THE PTA PRESIDENT...

Dear Shepherd Parents,

The reason we have chosen Shepherd for our children may vary from family to family, but the fact remains that we all have made a conscious decision to apply and enroll our children at Shepherd Elementary. My guess is that the strong academic program, in the context of a caring and supportive community, is a top reason for most families - I also see those factors as our school's greatest strengths.

The PTA needs your support. At the beginning of the year 150 families committed to participating in the 180 fund. However, at this juncture we only have 39 percent of families who have actually paid into the 180 fund. When we are applying for grants, we are often asked what our parent participation rate is.

Thank you to everyone who attended February's Snacks with the Principal. During our meeting, we discussed things such as indoor/outdoor recess, Terrific Kids, the 2010-2011 budget, volunteers, carpool and parent participation.

Terrific Kids

There were some concerns expressed about Terrific Kids and the feeling of "not being terrific" by some of our younger students. As a school, we attempt to make every student know they are terrific even if they do not receive an award. Terrific Kids is sponsored by the Shepherd Park Kiwanis Club. On this day, teachers may recognize one student or their entire class. It is the teacher's choice. As I explain to the students every first Tuesday, they are all terrific; however, there is no way we can recognize every student during one ceremony. At the end of the year, we will be having an Awards Day. This day is designated for teachers to give other students an opportunity to shine.

Indoor Recess

I have parents who say "if it is below freezing students should be inside" while I have others who say," send my child out no matter how cold". It is our goal to get our students outside every day. However, when the wind chill brings our below-freezing temperature into the 20s we keep our students indoors. Indoor activities vary. Some grade levels participate in exercises in their classrooms. Some watch a video. Some students are in the gym participating in small group activities with a few friends, some teachers have free play in the classroom while other students read. In any event, our ultimate goal is to get our students moving even if they are inside. However, it does present a challenge. A large number of students in the gym running around or throwing balls can be dangerous. If you are interested and would like to help us make our indoor recess time more active for our students, please volunteer your time.

Snow Make-Up Days Announced: The Orders From Headquarters

Dear Parents and Families of DCPS Students,

Our back-to-back snow storms earlier this month made history, and caused our children to miss numerous days of instruction. In figuring out the snow makeup calendar, we have consulted with the Office of the State Superintendent, DCPS instructional staff, the Washington Teachers Union, and a number of parents. Thanks to many of you who offered suggestions about how best to maximize instructionaltime, preserve family vacation time, and meet the state attendance requirements.

We explored a variety of options that included extending the school day, converting previously scheduled vacation days into school days, changing the dates of DC-CAS testing-but none of these proved workable.

In order to make up the lost snow days, the school calendar will shift as follows:

- * Friday, March 19th will be a regular school day. This was previously scheduled as a Professional Development Day for teachers, with no school for students.
- * Monday, May 17th will be a regular school day. This was previously scheduled as a Parent-Teacher Conference Day, and we will work with schools to ensure that teachers and parents schedule time to talk about summer learning and end-of-year topics during late May.
- * Friday, June 18th will be a full regular school day. This was previously scheduled as a half-day for students. It is now a regular full school day.
- * Monday, June 21st and Tuesday, June 22nd will be regular school days. The last day of school for students and teachers is June 22nd. These were the designated "make up days" built in to the calendar last year.
- * Monday, June 28th is the first day of summer school.

We appreciate your patience and flexibility. We understand that schedule changes can cause difficulties for families and it is our hope that these specific adjustments will cause the minimum amount of disruption.

However, even with the school's best efforts there are still some concerns. Please know your concerns have been heard and we are in the beginning stages of making changes for next year. The first step to change is hearing from you. Ms. Jennifer Pauk, the mother of Zora in pre-K, is working on a survey. This survey will be distributed to parents via the Mustang in the upcoming weeks. The information collected will be shared with me and used next year as we begin to reshape our aftercare program.



of constructing meaning from text. The goal of all reading instruction is ultimately targeted at helping a reader comprehend text. Reading comprehension involves at least two people: the reader and the writer. The process of compre-

ension succeed

hending involves decoding the writer's words and then using background knowledge to construct an approximate understanding of the writer's message.

Here are some activities that you can try at home to help build your child's vocabulary:

Activity 1

COMPREHENSION: The Comics

Directions:

- 1. Read and look at the Sunday comics with your child.
- 2. Cut boxes of comic strips apart.
- 3. Have your child tell the story by putting the strips in sequence.

Activity 2

COMPREHENSION: Who/What/Where/When Card

Directions:

1. Create a card that gives them cues on how to answer various types of questions.

Example:

Who - tells a character/person

Where - tells a place where action took place

What - tells the problem

Why – tells the reason something happened (because)

2. After reading a selection, show the cue cards to your child and asking him/her to respond to the cue.


