The tests are given to all District of Columbia Public School students in the appropriate grades. Test results are used to help teachers determine how much of the prior year's curriculum was retained by students, how much is being learned and where further work is needed.

While it's never too late to join in on the auction fun, some deadlines will still have to be met so that auction-goers can actually read descriptions of the items they'd like to buy. And the print shop is going to need time to prepare the auction book, too.

Then, under "Find a Yahoo Group," type in Shepherd_Elementary_PTA. Click on the big "Shepherd Elementary PTA" to get to the site.

Then, in the left column, click on "Files."

Next, click on the folder marked

"Auction 2010."

There, you will find five items to make the auction a bigger success with your help:

An advertising contract for the auction program booklet. Ads start at \$25 and go up to \$125 (auc-ads).

- A letter to businesses asking them to contribute goods and/or services to the auction (auc-biz).
- A letter to parents touting this year's auction, "The Carnival for Giving" (auc-letr).
- A sponsorship agreement for the auction. There are four levels of sponsorship ranging from \$500 (Mustang Sponsor) to \$2,500 (Platinum Sponsor). Be true to your school! (auc-spon).
- A donation form for anyone contributing something to be auctioned during either the silentauction or live-auction part of the April 30 auction (aucdonor).

There are just three weeks until the big auction. After you've helped out by getting auction items, sponsorships, and advertising, remember to buy a ticket or two to the auction! Tickets are just \$40 each, or two for \$70. A limited number of tables (seating six) are still available for \$210.

Franklin's, in Hyattsville, has great unpretentious American cuisine. It also brews the beer it sells on the premises. Learn the History of D.C. Emancipation Day

The enslaved people in Washington were freed nine months before President Abraham Lincoln issued his famous Emancipation Proclamation, telegraphing the eventual end of slavery to the rest of the nation. On April 16, 1862, President Lincoln signed the Compensated Emancipation Act, "for the release of certain persons held to service or labor in the District of Columbia," making D.C. residents the "first freed" by the federal government.

Emancipation Day celebrations were held annually from 1866 through 1901, and resumed in 2002. In 2005, Emancipation Day was made an official public holiday in the District of Columbia. Each year, a series of educational and commemorative activities is held during the week prior to the holiday that celebrates the end of slavery in Washington.

When Mayor Adrian Fenty came into office in 2007 he dedicated Emancipation Day to the continued pursuit for full democracy with a voting rights march to the Capitol building, demanding equal representation for D.C. residents in Congress.

Last year, the Office of the Secretary of the District of Columbia and the Office of Cable Television produced "Enslavement to Emancipation," an hour-long documentary examining D.C. history from slavery through emancipation. A 20-page booklet, "Ending Slavery in the Nation's Capital," was also published, highlighting the District's struggle for freedom.

And that's why there's no school next Friday.

Blair Pool Passes Available

Did you know that you can buy pool passes for the outdoor pool at the Blair Apartment complex? Now is the time to apply for the passes.

This year it's \$325 per family (maximum six members) or \$120 for a single pass.

The pool is open daily from Memorial Day to Labor Day. In past years, the hours have been 11 a.m.-8 p.m. There is a large pool that ranges from 3 feet to 8 or 9 feet, a separate wading pool for children 6 and younger, showers and changing rooms. The pool has adult-only swim for 15 minutes every hour. The policy on guest passes has varied over the years; in some years non-residents have not been permitted to buy guest passes.

This year, the applications are available online. You can pay with a credit card or print the application and mail it in with a check.

The passes often sell out well before the pool season begins.

It's Clean-Up Time!

Mark your calendar for the annual Rock Creek/Potomac Watershed cleanup on Saturday, April 10. Hours are 9 a.m.-noon. Once again, Clif Grandy will lead a cleanup site nearby at the Fenwick Tributary near North Portal Drive NW and East Beach Drive NW. This site is appropriate for kids (with parental supervision), so make it a family affair!

The Friends of Rock Creek's
Environment (FORCE) and the Alice Ferguson
Foundation sponsor the annual Rock Creek
Extreme & Potomac River Watershed cleanups to
improve the environment of the Potomac River
and Rock Creek watersheds. One of the cleanup
sites, the Fenwick Tributary, is in your backyard!
The cleanup is a community service opportunity to
help improve our environment. Volunteers are
needed!

The Fenwick Tributary consists of several underground and aboveground streams that drain 1,200 acres in the District of Columbia, Silver Spring and Chevy Chase. This stream is significant for the direct impact that it has on Rock Creek, the Potomac and the Chesapeake Bay. The two largest above-ground streams runs between North Portal and Portal drives and East Beach and West Beach drives near East West Highway, 16th Street and Rock Creek Park.

If you prefer, you can register on-site at North Portal Drive and East Beach Drive NW that morning, or, you may e-mail Clif Grandy at clifathebeach@starpower.net.

A second cleanup is scheduled in Rock Creek Park at 16th Street NW and Holly Street NW on Sunday, April 11, from 9 a.m. to noon. There are steep slopes and some potential for poison ivy, so this site is not for everyone. The cleanup needs 10-15 volunteers to reach maximum effect. There is parking on Holly Street just off 16th Street NW.
