FROM THE PTA PRESIDENT...

Dear Shepherd Parents,

I want to offer a big thank you to each of the 60 adults who came to last Wednesday's PTA meeting.

We had a lot of initiatives to unveil, and if we added a couple of minutes to the meeting by giving well-deserved applause to parents, principals and staff, then so be it.

But we also got down to serious business with a wide-ranging discussion under the title "Saturday Academy" to determine how best to move forward with educational enhancement efforts. The discussion was more evidence of how we can come together as a parent body to work toward a preferred future. By a show of hands, parents by a 2-to-1 margin said they favored some kind of "Afterschool Academy" that could save the school and PTA some money, but deliver the same high-quality academic enrichment now offered to students.

Tardiness

Tardiness continues to be an area of concern. Please strive to get your student to school on time. The gymnasium doors close at 8:40. Therefore you should strive to arrive at school before the door closes. Though there is a five minute grace period between the time the gymnasium doors close and when the tardy bell rings it is difficult for a student to get to their classroom on time if they arrive after 8:40. Behavior

For the past two weeks, I have been meeting with students on each grade level during their lunch/recess time to discuss their behavior. During our conversation the students and I talked about what it means to be respectful, responsible and safe at all times. Some of our biggest areas of concern are as follows:

Keeping hands and feet to ourselves- Students push and shove and they push and shove on the stairwells. As you can imagine, this can be dangerous and we have had students fall down the stairs.

Teasing-We do not expect every student to get along at all times. However, we do expect students to separate themselves from people they may have a conflict with. Students should not bully, tease, call people names, etc.

Restrooms-This year alone, we have had 3 soap dispensers pulled or kicked from the wall. We have had 3 known incidents of students urinating on the floor and wall, and 1 incident of a student or students spreading feces on the wall.

Cafeteria-Students continue to share food (though they have been told many times not to), they drop things and pretend they did not, and they are constantly jumping up out of their seats (they know they are to raise their hand if they need assistance).

Though the above list is limited, I share these with you so that you can begin/continue to address these issues and concerns with your student(s) at home. Students are easily influenced by their peers and even the most well behaved students often times find themselves "caught up" in negativity. Next week, Ms. Liggins, our school counselor, will continue to address behavior and provide parents with tips and activities you can do at home with your student.

Half Day/No School

Please be reminded that October 28th is a half day for students. School dismisses at 12:15 p.m. There will be no aftercare. Dismissal will proceed as normal. October 29th is teacher professional development day. There will be no school for students. Please plan accordingly.

IB Ceremony

Our IB ceremony for the month of October will be held on Wednesday. Each month we focus on a different IB Learner Profile in order to help build students' understanding. This month's profile is inquirers. Students have been learning what it means to be an inquirer and have been looking for evidence of inquiry. During our IB ceremony each classroom teacher will recognize a student from their classroom who has displayed the profile throughout the month. The ceremonies are open to all parents; however, if your child will be recognized you will receive a special invitation.

The Milk-y Way

If your child doesn't drink that kind of milk at home, it may taste differently, which would account for some of the complaints. You may want to work your way up from skim milk (or work your way down from whole milk) to get your child accustomed to the taste.

The Green Team would like to reduce waste throughout the school, and the more milk – and lunch – that goes into students' mouths and not in wastebaskets is an important step in not only cutting down on waste, but standing up for nutrition.

Art Corner



Dear Shepherd Parents and Caregivers:

Again time has flown. It was great to see so many parents on Conference Day. Thanks to those who came to the art room.

All grade levels are beginning new art units. We have gone from the study of line (the mark of a drawing implement or the edge of anything), to shape (any open line that comes back to where it started), value (the quality of light and dark), and color.

Pre-K students are going to learn to draw themselves with varied media. Kindergartners will be drawing "big" and "little." First graders are learning how to draw the human figure in various motions. Second graders will be drawing portraits, using fruits and veggies in the style of the artist Arcimboldo, for whom there is an exhibit currently at the National Gallery. Third graders are looking to night skies for their art inspiration. Fourth and fifth graders will begin large mural panels on weather and American workers, respectively.

Shepherd Students Join Food Drive and Walk for the Homeless

On Nov. 1, Shepherd ES students will participate in the 10th annual Food Drive and Walk for the Homeless. Staff from our partner organization, Hope and a Home, will present a short program in the auditorium. Students will then circle the track and deposit their donation of a non-perishable food item in the bins and boxes provided. The food will be taken to a nearby family shelter.

Everyone will participate. Fannie Mae supports all DCPS students in this free activity. Those who return their registration form will receive a Help the Homeless T-shirt.

Hope and a Home works with single parents with school-age children to provide transitional and more permanent housing as well as support in job and life skills training. Every registration means a \$15-\$25 donation to Hope and a Home from Fannie Mae if the organization gets 1,200-1,500 walkers. Shepherd has always had 300 or more walkers.

Color Me Mine:



Alice Deal Buddy Day

Are you considering having your fifth grader attend Alice Deal Middle School next school year? Then why not have your student spend the morning with a Deal buddy on Dec. 9?

During Buddy Day, your child will get a taste of a middle school day in the newly renovated, state-of-the-art facility. Did you know that Shepherd Elementary is a feeder school for Deal and that Deal is now constituted as a sixth through eighth grade middle school? Deal has also received recent authorization as an International Baccalaureate World School, which has brought significant change to Deal's traditionally strong program.

At Deal, teachers work as teams to manage small groups of students, providing a close connection to families and ensuring that all receive attention. The IB program has expanded the offerings of world languages and arts and music to all students, providing a richer, more developmentally appropriate array of courses. Deal Middle School has refocused its subjects and curriculum development work around smaller groups of teachers, rather than a wholeschool model. Deal also offers great extra-curricular afterschool activities such as jazz band, choir, basketball, soccer, volleyball, Model UN, debate team and fencing ... just to name a few. Even if you plan to send your student to another middle school, this is a great opportunity to have the middle school experience.

During the school year, the bus takes your kids straight to Deal. The D-31 is a devoted charter bus that picks up kids at 16th and Kalmia (with stops along 16th heading south) and takes kids right to the door. Students can either pay the Metro bus base fair or can get tokens at the student rate through Metro. Contact Deal for information on other charter buses that serve additional neighborhoods or go to.

www.wmata.com/bus/timetables/dc/d31-34.pdf, to view the bus timetables. Please note that the Deal buses pick up kids for home between 3:15 and 3:30 p.m., so parents are responsible for picking up their children following extra-curricular afterschool activities.

A parent letter will be given to fifth-grade students providing all details of Buddy Day, which is scheduled for Thursday, Dec. 9. In addition to Buddy Day, there will be scheduled chats with Deal's Principal
