IB Site Visit

Did you know that on Monday and Tuesday of this week, Shepherd had their much anticipated, long over-due International Baccalaureate authorization visit? For those of you who have been at Shepherd for the past 5 years you know that this has been a long journey. During the visit the site team met with parents, students, all classroom and special area teachers, some support staff members, the school's librarian, PYP coordinator and principal. They visited every classroom, walked the hallways and looked through binders full of supporting evidence. The site team was very encouraging and told us we were definitely on the right track. The outcome of the site visit will not be available for 3-4 months. At this time we will learn if we have been authorized or if we need to submit additional documentations or change some practices in order to become authorized.

Parent -Book of the Month:



Health & Wellness Corner

<u>Nutrítíon</u>

Preparation and Picky Eater Tips;

Include kids in lunch prep. "Kids are more likely to eat something if they're involved in making it. Starting at age three, kids can help pick out a piece of fruit," says [nutritionist Jennifer] Bevilacqua.

Limit choices. Don't ask your kids what they want for lunch—give them two or three healthy options to choose from. "If you stock your pantry with good foods only, then you can present just these choices to your child," says [pediatrician and nutritionist Mary Ellen] Renna.

Utilize hungry moments. "Take advantage of these times to introduce new foods," says Bevilacqua. Offer new foods in very small amounts along with familiar foods.

Make trying mandatory. Make it a rule that your kids at least sample new foods. [Janice Newell] Bissex, of the Meal Makeover Moms, also asks her daughter to explain why she did or didn't like a certain dish.

Educate them. Renna stresses the importance of letting kids know the benefits of each food. Tell them that calcium will help them grow strong bones, for example.

Looking good, feeling good. Presentation is a key part of eating. "How you package it is really important," say the Meal Makeover Moms. "It has to look fresh and smell good. Avoid the soggy factor. Kids love little portions, things cut into shapes, cute containers and dipping. A kid will never eat fruit that's turned brown. You can avoid this by tossing apple slices with a little lemon juice." [Any juice with vitamin C will keep fruit from turning brown.]

<u>Nutrítion News Flash</u>

The determination of PG County Nutritionist/ Dietician Christi Dorse to get MD lunch options in compliance with the Healthy Schools Program guidelines led her to work with a local dairy to come up with new flavored milk options. Now MD & DC schools will have a strawberry milk option that is fat free and has less sugar than the original formulation. The new kid-tested version uses beet juice for color and will cost the same as the original. Shepherd has also partnered with the Healthy Schools Program and is working to increase healthier student lunch options. For more information on this story visit:

<u>Physical Activity</u>

Kangaroo Jump: Tape a shoelace to the floor in a straight line. Have your child stand on one side of the string with both feet together. Count to three and cheer as he or she jumps over the string and back 10 times. Take a short break—and do it again!

Home Teams: Your children don't need to play organized sports to enjoy team activities. They can meet up with a few friends to shoot hoops, kick a soccer ball, play street hockey or throw a football or baseball. Check out your neighborhood recreation center for open gym times—and for other activities like tennis or swimming.

We learn more about ourselves and our loved ones when we stretch and test.

Knowing more of your fellow parents (both inside and outside your child's class) will expose you to their incredible talents as well. Use Logical Consequences


Often the consequences are too far in the future to practically use a natural consequence. When that is the case, logical consequences are effective. A consequence for the child must be logically related to the behavior in order for it to work. For example, if your child forgets to return his video and you ground him for a week, that punishment will only create resentment within your child. However, if you return the video for him and either deduct the amount from his allowance or allow him to work off the money owed, then your child can see the logic to your discipline.

Withdraw from Conflict

If your child is testing you through a temper tantrum, or being angry or speaking disrespectfully to you, it is best if you leave the room or tell the child you will be in the next room if he wants to "Try again." Do not leave in anger or defeat.

THINKING ABOUT BULLYING: THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN TATTLING AND TELLING

The following is information and quotes taken from "What works against bullies" by Patricia Kelley Criswell in the Christian Science Monitor 10/18/10

"80-90 percent of children say it's unpleasant to watch bullying, only 11 percent intervene, according to a 2000 report on bullying by the LaMarsh Centres for Research on Violence and Conflict Resolution in Toronto."

"When bystanders speak up, half of the time the bully backs down."

In light of these facts, the article recommends forgetting some old adages in fighting bullying, as they may truly give the wrong message.

DON'T TEACH: "Just ignore them", "Mind your own business, don't get involved," or Don't be a tattletale."

These may give children the impression that they should not do anything when someone is being hurt, and they may result in bullies continuing to have power.

DO TEACH children the difference between telling and tattling.

"Tattling is meant to make someone else look bad, there's not a victim involved."

"Telling, or reporting, is done in the service of others; **it's meant to help someone**. It's a heroic thing to stand up for someone who's being hurt, and we need to treat it as such – at home and at school."

Tell your children you expect them to defend others if they need help, and that this includes a variety of actions, including telling an adult what is happening.

Pick a handful of comebacks and practice them at home with your child. Role play potential scenarios such as what to do if a child makes a cruel remark or does something else to bull them or another person. Suggestions include: "What would make you say that?" Really? Seriously?

Kids learn from us, so we need to intervene if we see bullying -- not by bullying back, but by identifying the behavior and naming it for what it is.

KEEP READING-LIBRARY NEWS AND NOTES!

It's that time of year when report cards come out, but, as you may have noticed, your students do not receive a grade for library. In case you are wondering what's up with that, a brief explanation:

While Shepherd students all have regularly scheduled weekly access to the library, as an International Baccalaureate candidate school. Shepherd views the library as a resource rather than a stand-alone special subject. What that means is: there is no set library curriculum for which students receive grades. Instead, during any given library session we may be exploring themes related to social studies, science, or maybe even math in addition to language arts. Many times, students will be working on projects which originate or are continued in the classroom, and for which they will be graded. Other times, while actual grades may not be assigned for in-library work, we are reinforcing those critical reading and thinking skills so necessary to achieving passing scores on the standardized tests.

Here are just a few of the topics we've been covering over the past month:

PreK- stories relating to the IB unit "All About Me"

Kindergarten - reading stories and nonfiction books about the past and comparing them to our present-day lives

First grade - an online lesson about magnets

Second grade - several web quests (designed by Mr. King) about the different systems of the body and an online lesson/game about the food pyramid

Third grade - an online lesson about the phases of the moon

Fourth grade - a web quest about extreme weather

Fifth grade - a lesson on how to map the conflict in a story

Trick or Treat for UNICEF Nears \$300 Mark

ARE YOU SMARTER THAN A FIFTH-GRADER?

On Nov. 10 Shepherd Elementary School hosted its own "Are You Smarter than a 5th Grader?" contest. The PTA fundraising game started at 6:30 p.m. in the auditorium/gym before a crowd of about 150.

Audience members paid to \$7 to join in the fun. Seven adults, students' parents or members of the community, were the contestants.

In each round, there were two fifth graders at a table going against an adult contestant. Contestants answered 10 questions and one bonus question. If a contestant got all the answers right or quit before getting any wrong, then the PTA received prize money. If the contestant got any wrong, the 2011 class of fifth graders would get the money.

The contestants had three "cheats" to use to help make their decision. They could look at what the fifth graders wrote as answers on a dry erase board or ask the audience, who would shout out the answer they thought was correct--but the fifth graders couldn't say anything.

If contestants answered a question wrong, they had to say their names and that they were not smarter than a Shepherd fifth grader. Only one contestant answered all the questions right and quit before getting any wrong.

At the event's close, the 2011 fifth graders ended up with \$320 and the PTA \$50. The students will meet soon to determine how to spend their winnings.
