Shepherd is a Top Ten School – But It's Not Good News

Shepherd Elementary School has been identified as one of the Top 10 schools with Highest Negative Balances in Food Service charges. Shepherd owes \$7,355.17 to DCPS food services

Students fall into three payment categories: free, reduced or paid. Schools will start to accrue negative balances in Food Service charges when:

- Students who have been classified as paid make purchases without payment
- Students who do not qualify for free and reduced meals make purchases without payment
- Students who are eligible for free and reduced meals do not submit a FARM application and make purchases without payment

DCPS never turns away a student from the lunch line.

Two years ago, DCPS accrued nearly one million dollars in negative balance charges. Through aggressive processing of FARM applications, the balance was reduced to \$260,000 last year. This year there is a goal to reduce the total to less than \$100,000. The dollar savings will be utilized to provide food service programs such as salad bars and nutritional education.

How can you help? 1) If your financial status has changed, please contact the office for a Free and Reduced Lunch Meal application. Though you will still be responsible for your balances, your child will not accrue any additional charges. 2) Contact Ms. Frost in the cafeteria to see how much you owe and pay the amount. 3) Consider paying weekly/monthly 4) Check your child's account periodically and make payments.

Shepherd has been charged with the task of helping reduce the budget shortfall. Please do your part!

At Shepherd, all fifth grade students have "review tutoring" from 2 p.m. to 3 p.m.

The teachers and adults at the school who help with the review are: Ms. Laughinghouse, Ms. Hart, Ms. Stewart, Mr. Leonard and Ms. Ulba.

We have math one week and reading the next. The tutoring classes are held on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. These classes are meant to help us improve our DC BAS (Benchmark Assessment System) and DC CAS (Comprehensive Assessment System) test scores.

The first day, we worked on rounding numbers in Ms. Ulba's tutoring class. We worked on rules and how to understand rounding. "The tutoring class will give you a better understanding of past skills," said Ms. Ulba.

On the second day, Mr. Leonard's tutoring class worked on partial sums dealing with fractions. These classes will be very helpful.


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Healthy snack sale a tasty success, funds trip
