On Thursday, February 24, 2011, over 100 families (110 to be exact) joined us for our Family Math Night - Measuring Up to Success! Parents and students had the opportunity to play/participate in a variety of fun math activities. Participants were able to see the progression of how students learn measurement as they transition from PK through 5th grade. Students in primary grades spent time exploring how to measure using non-standard forms of measurement such as cubes, fingers, footprints, and bears. Students in upper grades explored standard units of measurement as they baked pizza, weighed teachers, measured their jump and reviewed measurement vocabulary. The Twenty-Second Annual Shepherd Jazz Night

March 11, 2011—7:00 PM

We remember the great Dr. Billy Taylor (1921-2010).



William "Billy" Taylor was born in Greenville, North Carolina. His family moved to Washington, D.C. when he was five years old. He graduated from Virginia State College with a B.S. degree in Music in 1942, and later earned a Masters and Ph.D. degrees in Music Education from the University of Massachusetts-Amherst. He also served as a Duke Ellington Fellow at Yale University, a great honor for musicians.

As a child, young Billy began playing the piano and practiced and practiced until he mastered the instrument. He took lessons and listened carefully to older great jazz musicians in order to learn more. Taylor started playing jazz piano professionally in 1944, starting in New York. He later became the house pianist at the Birdland Club. He performed there with pioneers of be-bop jazz, Charlie Parker, Dizzy Gillespie and Miles Davis. In 1958, he was the Musical Director of NBC's *The Subject is Jazz*. This was the first ever television series where the topic was jazz.

In 1961, Taylor founded New York's Jazzmobile, which provided high quality arts education with music classes for youth, lectures, and outdoor summer mobile concerts that traveled all around the city. He was an artist and a great educator who encouraged many young musicians for many years. He was a distinguished Professor of Music at East Carolina University in Greenville, North Carolina. Since 1994, he was the artistic director for jazz at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C

Taylor remained active with his educational activities and continued to tour and work into his eighties. He continued to work for over 50 years. He visited the White House several times and received awards from a President and a New York Governor. Taylor received an Emmy award for his work on television.

Dr. Billy Taylor showed us that with practice and love for music and your instrument, you can be a great artist and educator. When you share your talent, you can help others to enjoy. He showed us that you can be great at many things if you really want to.

Our famous personalities included Fred Valentine, and Baba Jamal Koram. Other speakers were Al Bigger, Landus Burroughs, Pauline Anderson and Larry James—all members of the Kwanis Club.

Fred Valentine made an impact on the third, fourth and fifth grade students as he shared his career experience as a major league baseball player. On September 7, 1959, at the age of 24, he began playing in the baseball big leagues with the Baltimore Orioles. Mr. Fred Valentine is the father of Ms. Valena Valentine-Nelson, one of our third grade teachers and her students were excited to meet him.

Baba Jamal Koram, an African American storyteller, entertained our staff and students in first and second grade with his songs and stories thru a lot of audience participation. He travels across the nation sharing his stories and his presence with thousands of school children and their families.

Family Math Night a Big Hit—To the Nth Degree

Dozens of Shepherd families made it back to school for Family Math Night, where students of all ages could participate in a variety of games and experiments to see how math principles work even in their own lives.

Every student who chalked up at least three Math Night stars or stamps was able to get a ticket for a raffle drawing to be conducted on Tuesday, the day after parent-teacher conferences.

Students in the "numbered" grades were treated to a wide variety of fun activities, including a weighing station, a capacity-checking activity, clock-making (in English and Spanish), the "Balancing Act," a long-jump measuring station, a cooking-with-math demonstration, and a series of story problems that was a cross between, "Who Wants to Be a Millionaire" and "Are You Smarter Than a Fifth Grade Teacher."

In the cafeteria, students in pre-K and kindergarten were abuzz with activities of their own, including a rhythmic clapping exercise, a test to see what is lighter or heavier, activities with building blocks, estimations, measuring heads and heights, filling the cup (or bowl), and the ever-popular Marvelous Marble Roll.
