Paced Interim Assessments (PIA)

Each advisory, students in 2nd through 5th grades will take Paced Interim Assessments (PIA). Our first PIA for this school year will occur on October 5th and 6th. This assessment will be used to help teachers and students learn more about what skills have/have not been mastered during the first advisory. From this information, teachers will develop re-teach plans which will allow students and teachers additional time to focus on the skills/standards where students need additional support.

Below are some helpful hints to get your child ready for their assessment.

Preparing for Testing

- Note test dates on your home calendar; schedule appointments on non-testing days.
- Encourage your child to take responsibility for homework and class study.
- Help your child learn how to find information independently.
- Praise your child for work done well.

Dear Shepherd Parents and Caregivers:

I'm happy to tell you that we are moving right along in art.

Pre-kindergartners are learning all about kinds of lines and can't wait to share.

Kindergartners have been looking at book illustrations to see how they add to the meaning of stories.

First graders are working on drawing themselves wrapped around their first initial in clever drawings that will surprise and amaze you.

Second graders having been looking at the art of Norman Rockwell to get an idea about authentic artworks about good citizenship.

Third graders are becoming architectural draftsman as they sketch famous monuments and buildings of Washington, DC.

Fourth graders are learning figure drawing as they compose books that show various yoga and sports poses.

14th Year for Tutoring Program in Neighborhood

The program meets every Sunday

The "Shepherd-TI Tutoring" program is getting ready to start up again. For the last 14 years, the program has provided free weekly tutoring to Shepherd Elementary students, and we are starting to recruit this year's group of students.

(except holiday weekends) at Tifereth Israel, the local synagogue at the corner of 16th and Juniper Streets NW. The tutors are mostly members of the synagogue and their teenage children, although we also have many tutors from the community and from other neighborhoods. (In fact, we are also looking to recruit additional tutors.) We match up a tutor and a student for the entire year, and they form a delightful relationship that helps fuel the learning. Every week the tutors work with their students on math, reading, vocabulary, current homework, or anything that the child's parent or teacher thinks would be helpful. Our goal is not to teach anything advanced, but to reinforce the lessons learned in school, and to try to add a little fun to doing schoolwork on the weekend.

We have a long list of successful alumni of the program, and many parents send their children back year after year for the program, because they find that it does encourage the students in their learning. The program is run by Shepherd Park neighbor Dan Nathan, whose two daughters attended Shepherd Elementary, and who works closely with the school in putting on the program. (Dan promoted the tutoring program at Shepherd's Back-to-School Night.) In the past, some of the program's tutors have come from the families of Shepherd students, such as their parents or older siblings; volunteering in the program is a good source of community service credits.

- Encourage your child to ask questions at home and in class.
- Assure your child knows that you value a good education.

Testing Day

- See that your child is rested and eats breakfast.
- See that your child arrives at school on time and is relaxed. School begins at 8:45 and if your child arrives late on testing dates, they will not be admitted to class until after testing. This will result in your child having to make-up that part of the test at a later time.
- Encourage your child to do the best work possible.
- Do not send your child to school if they are sick.
- Do not remove your child from school on test days for appointments.

Strategies for Reducing Test Anxiety

- Discuss the test openly and in a positive way.
- Have realistic expectations of your child's performance while encouraging his/her best efforts.
- Emphasize that the test is only one measure of academic performance.
- Emphasize that test scores do not determine a person's worth.

Sickness Bugs

Over the past few weeks we have seen an increase in the numbers of sick children Please do not send your child to school sick. If they have a fever or diarrhea, please allow a 24-48 hour period to pass before sending your student back to school. Thank you!

Salad Bar

The school's salad bar will re-open for students in grades 2nd through 5th on Tuesday, October 4, 2011 and will remain open every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. The salad bar is included with the meal of students who are purchasing or receive free and/or reduced lunch. Students who bring their lunch from home may purchase a salad for \$1.00.

DID YOU KNOW that children who watch a lot of TV and movies tend to:

Perform worse in school.

- They spend less time reading.
- They have shorter attention spans.
- Their vocabulary is not as highly developed.

Be more overweight.

- They snack excessively while watching TV.
- They see food in programs and ads that promote unhealthy eating choices.
- They tend to exercise less.

Act the way TV characters act.

- Children as young as 1 year old learn behaviors from television.
- Children imitate actions and scripts from TV programs instead of creating their own play ideas.

See ads that are harmful to them.

- Children under the age of 6 cannot tell the difference between an ad and a show.
- Children are encouraged to nag their parents for things they see on TV.

Children learn to see violence as an acceptable form of play and way to solve problems.

Important Facts and Figures

- *The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends no TV or videos for children under the age of 2.
- ★ Regularly watching TV for 10 or more hours a week has been shown to **negatively affect academic performance**.
- ★ The foods featured on TV are usually very unhealthy (high in sugar and fat) and contribute to obesity.
- **★ Entertainment violence** is stored in the brain as if it were a real experience. This "memory" can negatively affect behavior.
- ★ Children and adolescents in the United States spend 22 to 28 hours a week watching TV. By the time they are 70 they will have spent 7 to 10 years watching TV.

What you can do about your family's viewing habits:

Reduce the role of TV in your family.

- Agree to limit the time spent watching television. (to one hour a day, for example)
- Use a TV guide to help choose programs with your child.

Help your child turn off the TV.

- Give your child a warning a few minutes before the TV goes off.
- Help your child come up with things to do when the TV is off.

Watch TV with your kids and discuss what you're watching.

Some conversation starters:

- What did you think about that show/game?
- Did you like it when ____happened?
 Why do you think it happened?
- What was pretend and what was real? How could you tell?
- How can we tell the difference between the ads and the show?
- What would you do if you were in that situation?
- What do you think about how ____solved their problem?
 If you had a problem like that, what could you do /say?
 Can you think of a peaceful way to solve that problem?
- I wonder, why is it usually the male characters that fight?
- I've noticed that women need to be rescued by men a lot.
 Have you noticed that? I wonder why?
- I wonder, why do the "bad guys" have foreign accents?
 Wear dark colors? Have darker skin?

Find appealing non-TV activities for your family.

- . Go to your local library. A library card is free!
- Participate in library sponsored activities: story time, puppet shows, and craft activities.
- Have a family game night. Play board games, cards.
- Read books and tell stories together. Listen to books on tape/CD.
- Start a journal, scrapbook, or photo album.
- Have art supplies available: crayons, play dough, colored pencils, paper
- Sing songs or listen to music.
- Go for a walk.
- Do puzzles.

Promote healthy eating habits.

- Make sure TV snacks are healthy: apple slices, cheese or peanut butter and crackers, raw vegetables
- Resist junk food advertised on TV.
- Eat together as a family without the TV.

Get support from family and community.


