

This knowledge will allow Shared Inquiry to become a vital part of the everyday environment, allowing students to think and to respond critically.

The Great Books resources will support classroom programming for our Program of Inquiry through language rich and complex selections. The program will enable our students to become knowledgeable, great thinkers, and writers.

Starting in November, the Mustang will be published every other week. Next week, Nov. 7, will be our last weekly issue. The first week WITHOUT a newsletter will be the



your child has a fever, is vomiting or has a contagious illness, we understand that he/she cannot be here. Thank you for making school a priority for your child.

#### **Inclement Weather**

November marks the beginning of winter weather. Winter is knocking on our door and we need to get ready for the cold and possibility of snow! Please make sure your student is dressed properly for the weather. Also, please review the inclement weather policy in your parent handbook (it can be found on the school website, <a href="www.shepherd-elementary.org">www.shepherd-elementary.org</a>) and listen to the radio or watch the news if the weather is unpleasant. In the event of cancellations, delays or early dismissals, you will also be notified via the ConnectEd messaging system.

### Picking Children Up From School

Please remember to send a written note in with your child if you will need to pick him/her up from school early or unscheduled at the end of the day. A separate note for each child's teacher is preferred. This will eliminate any confusion at dismissal time and assure your child's safety. You should also contact the school if there is a change in your students' normal dismissal routine. Thank you for your understanding and cooperation.

#### Curriculum Matters: Learning Basic Math Facts

Many children struggle with learning basic facts. Teachers spend a great deal of time helping students develop "number sense." This in turn helps students to invent, share and refine strategies in the classroom. Basic facts are useful in estimation and mental math. For example, students can use their knowledge of 8 x 4 = 32 to know that a reasonable estimate for  $84 \times 41$  is  $80 \times 40 = 3,200$ . So what can you do as parents? Help your child by practicing their basic facts. First, set a reasonable goal: "Let's see if we can learn all the '+1 facts' for the numbers 0 - 9 in one week." Then spend about 10 minutes four times a week helping your child practice the facts. Make flashcards or play a game that helps them learn their facts. Ask them to explain their thinking.

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## Shepherd Elementary School TV-VG Turnoff Club

### Dear Parents:

As parents, public health professionals and members of the LSAT, this year we are promoting a TV-VG (Video Games) Turnoff Club initiative at Shepherd Elementary School. The club asks parents and students to think about their willingness to limit the amount of television and video games they watch on school nights. If you want to participate, fill out the form on the back with your child(ren) and return it to their classroom teacher, main office or the TV-VG Box at the auditorium entrance.

We recognize that there are many positive and educational programs and games from which children benefit. However, overwhelming research has shown that watching large amounts of TV or Video Games can have detrimental effects on children's academic and social development and is also linked to physical health problems such as obesity (for kids AND adults!).

TV-VG Turnoff offers **different levels** from which families can choose, so it is not necessary to totally give up TV or video games. TV-VG Turnoff Club is one tool to help students and families **set goals in this area during the school week**. Participation is completely optional and following the rules is up to students and families.

We will do our best to have outreach to students who sign up during the year. There will be information and articles frequently in The Mustang. Students who sign up will have their picture on the bulletin board next to the library. Outreach may be as simple as students receiving a letter in a fancy envelope or asking members to participate in a drawing activity and having drawings posted on the bulletin board.
