## Parent Education Events At Lowell School in Nov.

Two parent education events will take place this month at Lowell School, 1640 Kalmia Rd. NW, just a block from Shepherd Elementary.

Rev. Charles Gibbs, executive director of the United Religious Initiative, will speak on "To Believe or Not to Believe: Making Room for All in a Diverse Community," Wednesday, Nov. 9, at 7 p.m. The evening will feature a screening of "What Do You Believe?", an award-winning documentary about

the religious and spiritual lives of young people. Using



the film as a springboard, Gibbs will lead a discussion about how religion and spirituality affect the lives of children and teens and about the values that can help guide a diverse and healthy community. Cost is \$10 at the door.

On Friday, Nov. 11, Drs. T. Berry Brazelton and Joshua Sparrow will lead a one-hour seminar, "The Social-Emotional Wellbeing of Children," at 9 a.m. at Lowell's Parkside Auditorium. It's free. Brazelton is professor emeritus of pediatrics at Harvard Medical School and one of the world's foremost authorities on pediatrics and child development. Sparrow is co-author with Brazelton of eight books and a weekly New York Times Syndicate column, "Families Today." He is also a contributing editor to Scholastic Services' Parent and Child magazine.

## Shepherd IB PYP Corner

This Month's Learner Profile is Thinker. A thinker is someone who exercises initiative in applying thinking skills critically and creatively to make sound decisions and to solve complex problems. Critical thinking means "correct thinking in the pursuit of relevant and reliable knowledge about the world." It can also be described as "reasonable, reflective, responsible, and skillful thinking that is focused on deciding what to believe or do."

#### **Guidelines for Critical Thinking**

- Ask questions: Be willing to wonder. Be willing to ask "What's wrong here?" and/or "Why is it like this, and how did it come to be that way?"
- Define the problem: Ask neutral questions that don't presuppose answers.
- Examine the evidence: Ask yourself, "What evidence supports or challenges this statement?" Just because many people, including experts, believe it, doesn't make it right.
- Analyze assumptions and biases: All of us are subject to biases. Evaluate the assumptions and biases that lie behind statements or arguments, including your own.
- Avoid emotional reasoning: "If I feel this way, it must be true." Passionate commitment to a view can motivate a person to think boldly without fear of what others will say, but when "gut feelings" replace clear thinking, the results can be disastrous.
- Don't oversimplify: Look beyond the obvious, avoid easy generalizations, reject "either/or" thinking. Don't argue by rumor.
- Consider other interpretations: Formulate hypotheses that offer reasonable explanations of characteristics, behavior and events.
- Accept uncertainty: Sometimes the evidence merely allows us to draw tentative conclusions. Don't be afraid to say "I don't know." Don't demand "the" answer.

#### PYP Attitudes

The IB Primary Years Programme Attitudes help us to develop positive attitudes towards people, the environment and learning. There are 12 IB PYP Attitudes,

and three of them support the Learner Profile trait of Thinker. How?

- Independence: Thinkers are independent; they think and act independently, making their own judgments based on reasoned principles. Thinkers defend their judgments.
- Creativity: Thinkers are creative and imaginative in their thinking and in their approach to problems and dilemmas.
- Empathy: Thinkers are able to put themselves into other people's situation, in order to understand their thoughts, reasoning, and emotions. This ability to empathize allows for Thinkers to make informed decisions.

#### Curriculum Matters

When reading with your student at home, consider reading a variety of texts. Most often students are drawn to fiction texts. Though there is a time and place for fiction texts, we need to also make sure our students are exposed to more complex texts. At least once a week, select a piece of nonfiction literature to read to your student. As you read, stop, think aloud, and ask your student questions about the text. It is perfectly acceptable for the text to be above your student's reading level. A student's listening comprehension level is often a lot higher than their reading comprehension level.
