#### Registration

# Parents Vote to Have PTA Take Responsibility for Aftercare

In a show of hands at Wednesday's PTA meeting, parents voted to have the PTA assume responsibility for Shepherd's aftercare program.

The program, often referred to as "Star Achievers," has been a popular feature for parents, with 130 students taking part. But there have been several complicating factors in the mix, according to PTA President Bianca Bostic and Jennifer Pauk, a Shepherd parent and Local School Advisory Team member, who led the discussion.

Most D.C. Public Schools facilities are Title I schools, and aftercare is structured much differently. Since Shepherd is a Title II school, a separate nonprofit to administer aftercare was established several years ago. However, both Ms. Confer and Mr. Huff have indicated that they will retire. That also leads to several options.

One option, which the parents overwhelmingly voted

for, was to have the PTA administer Shepherd's aftercare. Another option was to hire a company that specializes in aftercare, but there could very well be insurance issues and more restrictive use of the school building. The cost would also likely

be higher than what parents pay for aftercare now.

Another option would be for no aftercare at Shepherd, forcing all parents to pick up their children at 3:15 p.m. and find childcare providers on their own. While that option may be more expensive (or even less expensive), parents at the meeting did not relish the thought of having to leave their jobs early every day to pick up their kids.

After the vote, a sheet of paper got filled up quickly with parents' names, phone numbers and email addresses to indicate their willingness to serve on an aftercare board. The most immediate tasks include establishing a set of bylaws to govern its activities, and hiring a program manager for aftercare.

"In order to achieve the ambitious goals we've outlined for our schools, we need to do more," said Henderson. "Innovation and continuous improvement are essential to growth in any industry, and education is no different. Our students deserve nothing less than our very best."

All schools in DCPS are eligible to apply for either of the two types of PWP grants. Major Grants (\$250,000-\$400,000) are designed for schools with the largest population of students in need of academic improvement or a group of students who need to make the largest academic gains. Targeted Grants (\$50,000-\$100,000) are designed for schools that want to focus on supporting a targeted intervention for a subgroup within a school.

Schools are encouraged to propose research-based approaches that have a track record of success in urban schools. They are also encouraged to focus their applications on how time, talent and technology can help them to make dramatic academic gains, such as extending the school day, utilizing technology in innovative ways, and rethinking how they ensure that their highest-caliber staff are reaching as many students as possible.

#### In Response to the Chancellor's Tweet

Shepherd Elementary School is in the planning stage of a proposal to expand school time for select grades. An expanded learning time will help us improve student outcomes in core academic subjects, broaden enrichment opportunities, and improve instruction by adding more planning and professional development time for teachers. Due to the many competing factors during the course of the school day, our students are engaged in less than three hours of instruction time per day. This limited time creates barriers and challenges as we strive to prepare our students for success beyond Shepherd. We want our students prepared for middle school, high school, college and the workforce, and we want them to lead healthy, fulfilling lives. In the next few days you will be receiving an announcement asking you to participate in a survey. The purpose of this survey is to get your thoughts about the idea of an expanded learning time.

#### **Snack Shack**

Starting Wednesday and every Monday, Wednesday and Friday until June, students may purchase healthy snacks from the Snack Shack located in the school cafeteria. The Snack Shack is

sponsored by the student council. Half of the proceeds raised will go to charity and the other half will help sponsor an activity during field day! All items will cost 50 cents or \$1. The Snack Shack will sell things such as fruit snacks, water, cereal bars, baked chips, and cranberry and raisin snacks among other things. Please support the Student Council by sending money on the days the Snack Shack is open.

#### **Fitness Friday**

Beginning Friday, April 27, students who arrive between 8:10 and 8:30 a.m. may gather on the playground and burn off some energy before the start of the school day. Students arriving during this time should enter the gymnasium and travel to the PE doors and exit to the playground. Pre-K and kindergarten students should play on the smaller lot. All other students may play on the larger lot. In the event of inclement weather, students will gather as normal in the gymnasium. Students must arrive on Fridays between 8:10 and 8:30 a.m. to play.

#### Strawberries and Salad Greens Day

Wednesday, May 23, is Strawberries & Salad Greens Day! Parents are invited to come and enjoy a scrumptious lunch with their student. The menu for the day will be: Rotisserie Style Bone-In Chicken with Whole Wheat Biscuit, Roasted Corn on the Cob, Side Salad with Local Greens, and Locally Grown Strawberries. Shepherd has also been invited to be a demonstration school where chefs will be on hand to conduct demonstrations and do activities with the students. # Shepherd Parent Testifies at D.C. Council's Education Budget Hearing

On March 28 I had the opportunity to give some testimony to the D.C. Council Committee of the Whole's

budget oversight hearing on education. I decided to do this after being on the Shepherd Elementary School LSAT (Local School Advisory Team) for two years and being a small part of the annual budget process that takes place each year. I was impressed that some schools were very well represented and got a lot of attention. I also realized that budget cuts have affected many schools and some much worse than Shepherd.

There are so many things about D.C. Public Schools and the budget process

that need addressing. I decided to focus on two main points. The first seems to affect Shepherd directly and I think it could potentially be changed with advocacy by parents. The second is something that just really annoys me because it seems to showcase a lack of transparency and understanding that pervades many of the DCPS systems.

I urge you to restore funding for the position of IB coordinator to IB schools and to keep this funding in the budgets of these schools. DCPS only financially supports schools such as SES with efforts to become an IB school for three years while the program is being established. Then the school has to be able to "sustain" the program. Since schools are not businesses that can generate revenue, sustaining any new program will come at the expense of other services that students benefit from. I've seen this as a member of the LSAT for the past two years. In addition to general budget cuts, SES has also had to assume responsibility for funding of the IB program, at the expense of other things at the school. These cuts have affected SES in a number of ways, including reduced the number of professional and paraprofessional staff who are available to work with children and support classrooms, reduced support for our art teacher to half-time, and cut the librarian position, among others.

Allow for enough time in the DCPS budget process to allow for planning and advocacy. A lot of us probably have jobs that work with budgets and budget processes, and we all have personal budgets to manage. So, have you ever had to plan out an entire year's expenses in less than a week? Well, that is what happens in DCPS. Every year in the spring, principals are given information on the next year's budget allocation

for their school. The principal has less than a week to share and exchange ideas about the budget with the LSAT, then submit requests to reprogram a part of the money, wait to see if these requests are approved, and then submit a final budget proposal. This process and these decisions really impact teachers, staff and our children. Yet there is no time to really explore options, let alone allow parents and staff to advocate for their schools' needs. I believe the process is designed to limit understanding and advocacy by school communities, and I think it should

be changed.

I'm not sure if it makes any difference if one parent testifies at something like this, but I do think it makes a difference if a group of parents does this over time, as well as take other actions. If you are interested in hearing more about this or have ideas about how to better position SES for resources, please let me know. Whether right or wrong, we know that the squeaky wheel gets the oil.

# Shepherd May Be Taking a Giant Step for 'Second Step'

A program that helps elementary-age students identify and deal with emotions that may crop up in their lives has had a welcome reception in first grade at Shepherd, and the possibility exists for the program to be expanded into other grades.

The program is called Second Step, and Shepherd parent Sam Collins explained how it works at last week's PTA meeting.

What it takes, he said, is 65 minutes a week of presentation and discussion among the students. Large poster-size

photographs help illustrate the emotions and feelings of the child pictured. The script text for the presenter is on the back of the poster.

It is, as Collins said, intended to raise the children's "EQ," or emotional quotient – along the lines of IQ.

One parent asked what academic subjects would suffer if 65 minutes were devoted each week to Second Step. Ms. Goldman, one of the first-grade teachers, responded that instructional time would actually increase because students will have learned to regulate the emotions that can disrupt learning in the classroom.

No action was taken on Second Step beyond the presentation, but the program offers curricula from kindergarten through fifth grade.
