Reading Strategy of the Week (Visualizing)

One of our school goals for the 2012-13 school year is to increase the number of students reading and comprehending at grade level. However, in order for this to happen, parents are asked to be their child's

Shepherd Elementary School is a virtual United Nations of musical diversity. This year's family music survey shows that Shepherd students and families play 26 different instruments, sing 23 different types of music, enjoy 49 different dances, and listen to 74 specific songs. Many of the songs and dances represent cultures and nations around the world, which is appropriate for an International Baccalaureate school.

The most frequently mentioned instruments played by Shepherd students and families are piano, guitar and drums. Other instruments include conga, djembe and kora.

The top musical styles are gospel/church songs, rhythm & blues, hip-hop, and jazz. Other musical styles include salsa, calypso, reggae, and African music.

Frequently mentioned dances are breakdancing, the Cupid Shuffle, the Dougie, the Electric Slide, and hand dancing. Other dances include cumbia and merengue.

Some of the songs mentioned include "America the Beautiful," "Black or White," Get Up Stand Up" and "Lift Every Voice and Sing." Several songs by these songwriters are on the list: Michael Jackson, Bob Marley and Sam Cooke.

Countries and regions represented in our family music include Ethiopia, Haiti, Mexico, West Africa, Indonesia, Jamaica, Guatemala, Georgia and India, among others.

Dear Shepherd Parents and Caregivers,

We are back in the swing of things in the art room. This week we will all (except for pre-K) begin art-projects based on studies in International Baccalaureate units for each grade level. Look in the Art Corner of the Mustang or on my website, http://teacherweb.com/DC/Shepherd/Art (and click on Announcements) for news about projects for your child. Kindergarten is experimenting with color-mixing and drawing pictures of art room object using the colors they make. In second grade, students will be creating images from leaf rubbings with chalk. Third graders will be taking a close look at classical features architecture that appear on notable buildings and monuments in our city. The fourth graders will be playing with paints to create their own versions of nebulas, supernovas and other phenoms in outer space. Fifth grade students are connecting the role of art in the development of scientific thought as we study the life and work of Leonardo da Vinci. Pre-K will be playing with new art materials as they learn color, shapes and types of line. It all should be great fun!

Some third- through fifth-grade students STILL do not have sketchbooks for homework. It is vital that kids be prepared for the home practice ahead. Their grade in art depends on it. Art homework "practice" not only improves artistic skills, but prepares students for decision-making, situation analysis, and skills like driving a car! So help your child come prepared to art. The Star Achievers Program is off to a great start

with a seamless transition from the program in past years to operation under a new administration! Over 110 students registered in the after school program and 40 in the before care program. Seasoned staff



are on-board and our new Program Director Claire Riley is working day and night (literally) on setting a schedule with assigned homerooms and specials schedule and improving the flow of students as they move throughout the building. A Board of Directors has formed and is working diligently to define short and long-term goals and provide guidance and support on many other issues related to program functioning.

Star Achievers strives to maintain an 18 students to 1 staff ratio. Currently, there is limited space available for students in some of the grades. Enrollment will be determined on a case by case basis and will depend on class size. In cases when the maximum class size has been reached, your child may be placed on a waiting list until there is room for them in the program. And remember, an enrollment is only complete when payment for a minimum of a month of aftercare has been made!

Drop-ins are welcomed, the cost for drop-in is \$30 a day, with no more than 4 drop-ins per month allowed per child. You MUST pre-register for a drop-in day with Ms. Riley BEFORE the start of the aftercare program on that day!

Shepherd Turned Off by TV, Video Games for a 3rd Year

TV Turnoff was a new initiative at Shepherd Elementary two years ago. Last year, it expanded to include video games. This year, we're not adding anything but the pledges of a growing number of students that they won't watch the tube or play video games — or limit their "screen time" — on school nights and school mornings.

In Shepherd's TV/VG Turnoff Club, students and their parents can choose one of three levels of limiting screen time:

The GOLD level is for no screen time on school days and nights.

The <u>SILVER</u> level is for no more than 30 minutes a night (and day).

The **BRONZE** level is for no more than 60 minutes a night (and day).

Why is limiting children's screen time important? While there are many educational programs on TV or online children can benefit from, these are no replacement for activities that actively engage children in the world around them.

In fact, too much TV or video games can even be bad for children. First, lots of screen time has been linked to lower levels of physical activity. Being active has a direct relationship to health, and in particular childhood and adult obesity. Kids watching TV are sitting, and this activity burns fewer calories than almost anything else. Also, kids (and adults) tend to eat and drink when they are watching TV, and a lot of the time this means junk food and sugary drinks. So not only are we not getting exercise to help burn calories, we often consume more calories while we watch TV!

Second, some studies have shown that students who limit their screen time have higher reading, math and language scores. They are spending more time in regular activities like reading, drawing, playing games or sports, talking with adults or playing imaginatively alone or with other kids. These activities don't have to be super-special

classes or structured activities. Regular play affects the brain and body in positive ways: It builds brain cells, improves physical strength, increases knowledge and builds relationships with others.



Finally, the type of programming that children watch needs to be monitored. Some studies have shown a relationship between the amount of children's exposure to violence or inappropriateage content on television or video games and problematic behaviors such as bullying or violence in childhood and later in life. Of course, this doesn't mean that children who watch violence will become violent or bullies, but it does mean that children are influenced by the messages they see on television.

The Local School Advisory Team is sponsoring this year's TV/VG Turnoff Club. You can fill out the sheet included in this week's Mustang. Or you may get one from your child's teacher. You can also pick one up during Wednesday's Back to School Night, and even at Saturday's Fall Fest.

Admission to Fall Fest is free and open to all!

Ride and Activity **Tickets** *must be purchased at the ticket booths.*

- Tickets are sold for \$1 each.
- There will be two ticket booths one at 14th & Kalmia (will accept cash & checks) and one outside of school auditorium (will accept cash & credit cards).
- Tickets are required for games and activities (classroom booths).
- Tickets may be used for rides and food purchases.
- ◆ Tickets are *not accepted* at Vendors Row (school auditorium).

Moon Bounce Rides:

- 3—4 tickets per ride
- ◆ Ticket booths will sell wristbands for \$20, entitling wearer to unlimited rides during Fall Fest.

Games and Activity Booths:



Each week as we focus on reading we will highlight one reading strategy. In the classroom students from pre-K through fifth grade will learn about the strategy and have an opportunity to apply the strategy. At home, parents are asked to model the strategy when reading with or to your student and encourage our independent readers to utilize the strategy while reading.

Visualizing

"If I can't picture it, I can't understand it." -- Albert Einstein

"It is impossible even to think without a mental picture." – *Aristotle*

"Man's mind cannot understand thoughts without images of them." -*Thomas Aquinas*

Why is visualizing so important?

- Visualizing involves picturing in your mind what is happening in the text.
- When you visualize narrative text, you use sensory images like sounds, physical sensations, smells, touch, and emotions described in the story to help you picture the story.
- The brain "sees" in order to store and process information.
- Visualization is directly related to language comprehension, language expression, and critical thinking.
- Imagery is a primary sensory connection in the brain.
- Visualizing improves comprehension of narrative and expository text.

Being able to create images, story worlds, and mental models while reading is an essential element of reading comprehension, engagement, and reflection. In fact, without visualization, students cannot comprehend, and reading cannot be said to be reading.

As you read you create pictures in your mind of:

- events and actions
- characters and their features, clothing, etc.
- settings and situations
