Dear Shepherd Parents and Caregivers,

In last week's column I urged you to TALK to your kids about their art and writing. If you already are asking them about it you should know about the FUN we are having in art. Fifth graders began sketches this week of their authentic "inventions." In fourth grade students are making outer-space abstract paintings that are out of this world! The architecturally savvy third graders are sketching notable D.C. buildings and monuments. The second graders went out to the Shepherd garden to draw plants "en plein aire" from observation. First graders are learning figure drawing while kindergartners have just finished superb drawings of art room objects free hand! Pre-K students used found objects to create various types of straight lines. As you can imagine, while providing solid content and art learning, all of it was great FUN!

Make your child tell you the about details that lead up to the big ideas of lessons they have worked on in art. Press them to talk even if they struggle to explain. Ask, "Why did you have to create it in that way?" "What was the big idea?" "Why was it easy (or hard) to do?" "Can you show me how to do that?" They'll get better at talking if you persist. Conversing with children about their art work (and other subjects) will help your kids keep it all alive in their world. Just your interest is enough to make the difference between them holding on to their learning or having it fade.

Homework is relevant to the art grades for students in grades 3, 4 and 5. It is vital that kids have a sketchbook to use for these assignments. At Plaza Art at Silver Spring and Georgia Avenues in Silver Spring, they know which sketchbook your child needs. Just go there and mention Shepherd!

These volunteers and students meet every Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning during the school year. Due to the fact that we try to keep the volunteer to student ratio to 1 to 3, we are unable to welcome any new students to the club. However, please keep watch for other opportunities. Reading Volunteers Needed

We are currently seeking individuals who can commit one, two, or three mornings between the hours of 8 and 8:30 a.m. to read with students in third through fifth grade. We have several older Shepherd scholars who are eager to share their love for reading with you. Focus on Literacy

This week's strategy is asking questions. This week students are learning about how to ask questions when reading. Good readers know how to answer and ask questions when reading text to help them understand what they are reading. There are several ways you can help your student answer and ask questions when reading and or being read to at home. One strategy is the question-answer relationship (OAR) strategy. This strategy helps students understand the different types of questions. By learning that the answers to some questions are "Right There" in the text, that some answers require a reader to "Think and Search," and that some answers can only be answered "On My Own," students recognize that they must first consider the question before developing an answer.

Why use question-answer relationship (QAR)?

- It can improve students' reading comprehension.
- It teaches students how to ask questions about their reading and where to find the answers to them.
- It helps students to think about the text they are reading and beyond it, too.

• It inspires them to think creatively and work cooperatively while challenging them to use higher-level thinking skills.

How to use question-answer relationship (QAR)?

1. Explain to your student that there are four types of questions they will encounter. Define each type of question and give an example.

Four types of questions are examined in the QAR:

- a) <u>Right There Questions</u>: Literal questions whose answers can be found in the text. Often the words used in the question are the same words found in the text.
- b) <u>Think and Search Questions</u>: Answers are gathered from several parts of the text and put together to make meaning.
- c) <u>Author and You</u>: These questions are based on information provided in the text but the student is required to relate it to their own experience. Although the answer does not lie directly in the text, the student must have read it in order to answer the question.
- d) <u>On My Own</u>: These questions do not require the student to have read the passage but he/she must use their background or prior knowledge to answer the question.
- 2. Read a short story/passage aloud to your student.
- **3.** Have predetermined questions you will ask after you stop reading. When you have finished reading, read the questions aloud to your student and model how you decide which type of question you have been asked to answer.
- **4.** Show your student how to find information to answer the question (i.e., in the text, from your own experiences, etc.).

It Works for All of Us: The 180 Fund

With roughly 340 students spread across seven grade levels, Shepherd Elementary, despite its small geographical footprint, can seem mighty big at times. But the 180 Fund is the glue that holds together students and their parents plus the staff.

You see all those computers in the computer lab? Those were bought with 180 Fund contributions. The "Afterschool Academy" initiative of two years

ago? That's right: our 180 Fund dollars. The tarp that Support Shepherd PTA's protects our two-year-old auditorium floor for big events? Yes: Purchased with 180 Fund proceeds.



And those are just three examples of what the 180

Fund has done for Shepherd since it was initiated in 2009. If there is a need, and the school's budget can't cover it, perhaps the 180 Fund can. But to fund things properly, it needs contributions from parents.

All contributions are tax-deductible. You can give \$180 in one lump sum, or two installments each semester of \$90 each, or four installments each quarter of \$45 each. If you don't think you can afford even \$180 over the course of the 180-day school year, then please give what you can. On the other hand, if you can contribute more than \$180, contributions of any size are tax-deductible, and if you give \$500 or more, you can consider yourself immune to future fundraising appeals.

Thanks to you, it works for all of us: the 180 Fund.
