

Get Caught Reading

The start of each session will be about reading. If our students can read and comprehend text, they are more likely to be successful in other con-



tent areas. To remind you, we are striving for 90 percent proficiency in reading. This means every time I communicate with you, you will hear me talk about reading and it is our desire that each of you will make READING the topic of conversation in your homes.

A Day ON, Not a Day Off

What have you done at home this week to help your student to become a better reading? One thing Shepherd teachers did was spend the week focusing on Guided Reading Instruction and working to make sure we are Guided Reading Experts.

"Guided reading" is a strategy that helps students become good readers. The teacher provides support for small groups of readers as they learn to use various reading strategies (context clues, letter and sound relationships, word structure, and so forth). Although guided reading has been traditionally associated with primary grades, it can be modified and used successfully at all grade levels. For example, older students may need to learn new strategies to understand how to read an information book in a way that is going to give them access to the information they are seeking.

Reading Tip

each of you received a mClass Home Connect report. Utilize this information received during the conference to help you structure your reading time home.

Reading Strategy

This week's reading strategy is summarizing. Fountas and Pinnell (reading experts) remind us that as readers, we are constantly extracting information from a piece of text and condensing that information in some type of summary form. To summarize a piece of text, a reader need not just recap the text after reading, though that is indeed a needed skill. Readers must constantly engage in some sort of ongoing interpretation of what they are reading, by putting together what has been read so far as they continue to process the text. A reader must be able to identify information while reading, extract that information from the print, and form an ongoing synopsis of what it means.

The art of summarizing involves bringing all that information in a concise form so that the reader then takes that information from the text and makes it his own. Sound difficult? It is. Summary is a difficult skill for students for a variety of reasons. First, the student must identify the genre — generating a summary of narrative text is different from summarizing expository text. Second, the student must be able to discriminate between trivial details and important ideas. Good summaries do not have many trivial details. Finally, if the passage being summarized is narrative, then the student must identify information that is important to the plot. And if the passage is expository, the student must identify information that is important to the topic.

What can you do? When reading with your student, have them tell you what happened at the beginning, middle and end of the story. Help them to identify the main points and leave out all of the extraneous details. The goal is for your student to be as concise as possible.

PTA Meeting Highlights

Here's just some of what happened at last Wednesday's PTA meeting:

Mrs. Miles, the principal, told parents to be on the lookout for a flyer promoting Oct. 30's Literacy Night program. She also asked parents to ask their students' teachers about the reading level of their children during parent-teacher conferences.

First-grade students won a uniform-free day since parent turnout in that grade had the highest percentage of all grades, with nearly one-third in attendance.

The PTA approved a proposal to restructure the budget to allocate \$1,000 per grade level, and \$500 per "specials" classroom, from the 180 Fund, for items and activities specified by those teachers. (See related story in this issue for full details.)

Ms. Riley, the new Star Achievers director, gave an overview of the aftercare program. She noted that a volunteer parent board has been meeting every three weeks or so to effect a smooth transition from the program run in the past by Ms. Confer and Mr. Huff to the current model. Star Achievers tries to shape its activities to the school's academic program – such as a book club or monthly visits by the neighborhood library's children's librarian -- with an emphasis on safety. While Star Achievers was originally structured to accommodate 150 students, only 110 are currently enrolled in aftercare. The activities schedule will be adjusted so that there are 15-18 students per activity. Each grade has an adult accompany them throughout the aftercare sessions, which can include things like homework and snack time, computer lab, dance, language, physical education and other activities. Ms. Riley held out the possibility that some students not enrolled in Star Achievers might be able to participate in some aftercare activities. A newsletter will be started soon for parents of children in Star Achievers, and she hopes that online payments will be in place by Nov. 1.

The school bank is back in business. A schedule will be set up for students to deposit their money into their own savings account with PNC Bank.

Local School Advisory Team Meeting Highlights

In **September**, LSAT members heard a report on the new Safety Patrol, with an eye toward finding funding for ponchos and rewards for Safety Patrol students. They also agreed to sponsor the TV/Video Game Turnoff Club. The LSAT started drawing up measurable goals for its three core priorities for 2012-13: academic enrichment; community engagement; and climate and culture. While Shepherd's DC-CAS test

scores were up pretty much across the board, the task of how to explain what the numbers mean in an individual student's DC-CAS report will be sent to the school's Academic Committee for a planned "Testing Night" at the school, which would also include examples within categories being tested at different grade levels. Rosetta Stone was being installed on all computers in the computer lab so Spanish students could enhance their learning of Spanish when not in direct classroom instruction.

In **October**, much of the meeting's focus was on the school's

push to bring the percentage of students who score "proficient" or "advanced" to 90 percent. The goal of Shepherd's "Get Caught Reading" campaign is to match students' love for reading with performance on the final TRC assessment. Among the avenues that may be explored to get more books into the hands of more students is Pizza Hut's "Book It" program, the monthly Scholastic Book Club catalogs, a Shepherd Park Library free-book incentive program, a weekly "Mystery Reader" during lunchtime, and Reading Is Fundamental book inventories. A visual component will be posted at the school to remind students of what needs to be done to reach reading and test-score targets. One LSAT member will investigate the possibility of bringing DCPS/MPD fingerprinting equipment to

Shepherd, or using some acceptable alternative, to make volunteer recruitment easier, since volunteers from among parents and the neighborhood will be critical to the success of this initiative. With photos on the school website being out of date, new banner photos are slated to be installed, and individual photos on each individual page, by the end of October. Three Shepherd student teams will compete Jan. 9 in the Geo-Plunge, and classroom spelling bees were being set up to prepare for a school-wide bee. Also, contacts have been made with NOAA for Shep-

herd's participation in a science fair with individual entries for grades 3 -5 and classroom entries for K-2. An LSAT member was going to try to convince some retired librarians he knows to volunteer some of their time at Shepherd. Another LSAT member was going to ask a kickball teammate to coach the school's co-ed kickball team. The PTA was asked to work with the D.C. PTA to advocate for DCPS' fair share of any D.C. budget surplus, currently estimated at \$140 million. While a traffic control officer is assigned to Shepherd, that person has been sick since the start of the school year. Substitutes have

recently come to Shepherd to perform those duties. Queries have been posed to the D.C. D-DOT director, with no reply. One parent is interested in improving the traffic situation, and a D-DOT representative observed the morning drop -off routine for her evaluation.

The LSAT's next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, Nov. 13, 4 p.m. at the school. Non-members are welcome to attend, but may be asked to leave when confidential issues arise. 180 Fund Reallocated to Help Classrooms

At last Wednesday's PTA meeting, those in attendance approved an amendment to the 2012-13 PTA budget that had been approved the month before. Here are the details:

That \$7,000 be taken from the projected 180 Fund revenue of \$18,400 and be reallocated to give each grade level from pre-K through fifth grade \$1,000 for its own dedicated use.

An additional \$4,000 be taken from the same 180 Fund revenue and be reallocated to give each of the "specials" classrooms – French, Spanish, physical education, art, music, reading and the two special education classrooms— \$500 for its own dedicated use.

These funds are intended to enhance the curriculum with additional resources such as International Baccalaureate materials, science kits, software, books and fields trips not covered by the school budget.

Fifteen separate line items will be created in the budget so that each grade and special can plan and track its own spending separately.

The amount is upwardly scalable should 180 Fund revenue exceed the original projection, but not be less than \$1,000 per grade or \$500 per special.

Look elsewhere in the Mustang for an exhortation for all families, including yours, to contribute to the 180 Fund.

TRAFFIC SAFETY UPDATE

We have a crossing guard again.

The guard assigned to Shepherd had been sick since before the start of the school year. Our current crossing guard has been stationed at the intersection of Jonquil and 14th. He not only wears the bright green vest, but painted on the palms of his gloves are red STOP signs just to emphasize the point that the intersection is a four-way stop. Please practice safety at Shepherd no matter what time you arrive or leave the school.



Shepherd families: We need your help! At present, more than 40 percent of the local homeless population is comprised of families -- and 35 percent of those families are headed by working adults. Over the last decade, D.C.-area rents have grown faster than in most major cities and outpaced most households' incomes. The low-cost rental stock has shrunk by more than 33 percent.

Our school has teamed up with an organization called Hope and A Home to raise money for the homeless program. On Friday, Nov. 2, Shepherd Elementary staff and students will participate in a walk to raise money. Parents and family members are urged to join us. Hope and a Home will do a 15-20 minutes presentation focused around the issue of homelessness, followed by a walk on the school's lower field. We will begin at 9:30 a.m. with the pre-K through second grade students, followed by third through fifth Grade students at 10:00 a.m.

The Hope and A Home program offers housing to homeless families and works with parents to help them complete their education, improve their job skills, and learn to manage family finances. In partnership with the Fannie Mae Foundation's Help the Homeless program, this event will help Hope and a Home raise funds that are greatly needed to carry on their work with families. Walking for the Homeless will help Hope and a Home provide housing and supports for homeless families in Washington.

This event is free for students. 100 percent of your contributions are tax-deductible and will directly serve children and families in Hope and A Home. Please go on line to our school's website to register. We need at least 1,000 walkers, in person or virtual, to register and this will earn us

The 180 Fund: The Challenge Is On to Help All Students

With last week's PTA action to reallocate \$11,000 from 180 Fund revenue to be given to teachers at each grade level and in each "specials" classroom for their needs not covered by the school budget (see separate story), it's now up to us — ALL of us — to contribute to the 180 Fund.

The PTA budget, based upon revenue assumptions

from last school year, is based on 80 families contributing to the 180 Fund. To date, five families have given \$500, and 23 families have already given the full \$180 — equivalent to a buck for each of the 180 days



on the school calendar. Still others have given contributions on the installment plan — a monthly, quarterly or per-semester amount that works better with their family budget.

With upwards of 340 students at Shepherd, that means we have upwards of 240 households. We need at least a third of those families to give to the fund. Ideally, ALL families should give, since ALL students will benefit. And the PTA has the authority to add money should our 180 Fund revenues exceed projections.

Now it's your turn. You can use the form that's been the back page of every issue of the Mustang since school started. But did you know that you can also give online? It's true! Just go to the homepage of the school website, www.shepherd-elementary.org. In the left column closer to the bottom, you'll see a green bar with the Mustang logo that proclaims, "NOW! You can contribute to Shepherd online!" Click on that bar, which takes you to a page with another click-on underneath the story behind the 180 Fund. That'll get you on your way. Or, if you like keeping your copy of the Mustang intact, you can print a 180 Fund donation form from that same web page.

Either way, your contribution will benefit all teachers and all students at Shepherd. So what are you waiting for?

The Handbook Says: What You Need to Know About The

International Baccalaureate's Primary Years Programme

Shepherd Elementary is an International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme (IB PYP) school.



How does the PYP operate?

At the heart of the Primary Years Programme philosophy is a commitment to structured inquiry as the main way of learning. It is based on a constructivist view of learning. "Our beliefs, models or constructs are revisited and revised in the light of new experience and further learning". Each year from KG-Grade 5 each student will be involved in 6 units of inquiry matching the following six universal organizing themes (Early Childhood students are engaged in 4 units each year):

- Who we are
- ▶ Where we are in place and time
- ▶ How we express ourselves
- How the world works
- How we organize ourselves
- Sharing the planet

Students explore universal ideas and subject areas through these themes into which are integrated trans-disciplinary skills in the following domains: thinking, social, communication, self-management, research.

Shepherd has developed and continually purchases items to support the 44 units of inquiry to give students a well-rounded and developmental educational experience. Each unit is carefully planned and students are encouraged to contribute their own curiosity to the development of each unit. The units are transdisciplinary, spanning and integrating traditional subject areas where desirable. They are

Students act as tellers and tally the deposits. All that's needed to open an account is \$5. Only cash and checks are accepted for deposits at the school, but students may add to their account at any PNC branch anywhere in the country (including the one on Georgia Ave. NW).

After considerable discussion, a motion directing the PTA to establish a restricted account for the parents of first graders to enable them to make purchases of supplies and equipment specifically for those students was withdrawn.
