If not, please email your teacher today and be sure to copy me on the email. Every parent and student is expected to know where they are, where they are going and have a plan to get there.



How many books did your student read last week? While reading to your student or listening to your student read, what reading strategies did you apply? Did you encourage your student to make connections, did you ask them questions, did you have them make predictions or inferences or did you have them retell? Remember the key to being a good reader is more than calling words. Good readers also know how to ask and answer questions about what they have read or heard.

Election Day and Early Voting News

If you were a Shepherd parent four years ago, you may remember the long lines outside Shepherd Elementary as residents patiently waited in lines for two-and-a-hours to cast ballots in a historic election.



Shepherd Elementary once again will be a polling place on Tuesday, Nov. 6, Election Day, for Precinct 62 in Ward 4, which includes just about all of the Shepherd in-boundary attendance area. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Election Day. Will there be huge lines like we saw in 2008? Or just the 40-minute lines we experienced just before the lunch period in the 2004 presidential election?

One hint: Lines are shorter in the late afternoon and evening, but you may want to factor in enough time to vote first before you pick up your child from Star Achievers Aftercare. Or, you can take your child to the polls to witness your participation in democracy.

Another hint: Take part in early voting. There is one early-voting site in each ward. Ward 4’s site is the Takoma Recreation Center, 300 Van Buren St. NW. Hours are 8:30 a.m.-7 p.m. Monday, Oct. 29-Saturday, Nov. 3.



Music Class Songs

In the next couple of weeks, music students will hear and sing several types of songs that show "dynamics" (loud and soft) or International Baccalaureate topics. For example, students will hear excerpts from Haydn's "Surprise Symphony" and from Grieg's "Hall of the Mountain King." These dramatic classical pieces tell stories with loud/soft sounds and faster tempos.



Our second graders will watch Michael Jackson's "Earthsong" and think about animals and plants in the rainforest and how we can help save them. Third graders will learn about adaptation by three musicians who overcame disabilities: Evelyn Glennie (deaf percussionist), Ray Charles (blind singer/songwriter), and Stevie Wonder (blind composer/pianist/singer). Our fourth graders will hear the coal-mining saga of "John Henry" as they consider how rocks and minerals affect our lives. And fifth graders will listen to songs about the experiences of Native Americans during the era of westward expansion.

IB Learner Profiles



The aim of all IB programmes is to develop internationally minded people who, recognizing their common humanity and shared guardianship of the planet, help to create a better and more peaceful world.

IB learners strive to be:

- **Inquirers** - They develop their natural curiosity. They acquire the skills necessary to conduct inquiry and research and show independence in learning. They actively enjoy learning and this love of learning will be sustained throughout their lives.
- **Knowledgeable** - They explore concepts, ideas and issues that have local and global significance. In so doing, they acquire in-depth knowledge and develop understanding across a broad and balanced range of disciplines.
- **Thinkers** - They exercise initiative in applying thinking skills critically and creatively to recognize and approach complex problems, and make reasoned, ethical decisions.
- **Communicators** - They understand and express ideas and information confidently and creatively in more than one language and in a variety of modes of communication. They work effectively and willingly in collaboration with others.
- **Principled** - They act with integrity and honesty, with a strong sense of fairness, justice and respect for the dignity of the individual, groups and communities. They take responsibility for their own actions and the consequences that accompany them.
- **Open-minded** - They understand and appreciate their own cultures and personal

histories, and are open to the perspectives, values and traditions of other individuals and communities. They are accustomed to seeking and evaluating a range of points of view, and are willing to grow from the experience.

- **Caring** - They show empathy, compassion and respect towards the needs and feelings of others. They have a personal commitment to service, and act to make a positive difference to the lives of others and to the environment.
- **Risk-takers** - They approach unfamiliar situations and uncertainty with courage and forethought, and have the independence of spirit to explore new roles, ideas and strategies. They are brave and articulate in defending their beliefs.
- **Balanced** - They understand the importance of intellectual, physical and emotional balance to achieve personal well-being for themselves and others.
- **Reflective** - They give thoughtful consideration to their own learning and experience. They are able to assess and understand their strengths and limitations in order to support their learning and personal development.

What is different about the PYP?

The goals of the PYP are consistent with the philosophy and goals of Shepherd in providing an international education. Its framework and emphasis on inquiry learning allows us to achieve these effectively. It demands a true partnership between students, teachers and parents in the school community.

- ▶ Children are actively engaged in in-depth exploration of issues and themes of universal significance.
- ▶ The curriculum is designed to develop students who reflect a learner profile of attitudes and learning which will allow them to

participate to better advantage in the world they will enter as adults.

- ▶ The PYP classroom is student-centered, while teacher-directed. Students are encouraged and developed to be active learners and critical thinkers.
- ▶ Students are encouraged to initiate socially responsible action based on their learning.

How will my child be assessed?

All assessment of student work in the PYP is carried out by your child's teachers. There are no externally set examinations or externally moderated work. Your child will be assessed in many ways. Shepherd uses a variety of school-based assessments, including student/teacher/parent conferences, writing samples, structured observations and performance tasks, tests and formal assessments. Most importantly, your child will be involved in developing the criteria of assessment with the teacher and will understand how he/she will be assessed before many assessments take place. This partnership will engender a much greater understanding of assessment, develop better self-assessment, and raise personal achievement expectations. This is part of the PYP goal to increase students' awareness of their own learning.

Why has Shepherd adopted the PYP?

- The PYP curriculum is a framework that fits the mission, philosophy and goals of our school.
- The curriculum is based on sound knowledge and understanding about how children learn and how the brain works.
- It allows us to have considerable flexibility in the choice of content and topics that our children will study as appropriate to our school.
- It engages our children in the kind of learning that they will continue throughout their lives.

Hope and A Home program offers housing to homeless families and works with parents to help them complete their education, improve their job skills, and learn to manage family finances.
