Reading

Our students have made great gains in reading. However, there is still a lot of progress to be made. Please continue to read with your student nightly and



spend time having them use their reading strategies.

Spanish

We are still working diligently to find a long-term substitute or permanent teacher to fill our current Spanish teacher vacancy. We have some promising options and as soon as I am able to finalize some things, I will share more about our next steps. Mrs. Hart has been working closely with our language department to put a plan of support in place in the interim.

Preschool at Shepherd

We have received several calls and inquiries about Shepherd possibly having a Preschool (3-year-old program) next year. Shepherd will not have a 3-year-old program for the 2013-14 school year.

School Visitor Policy

All schools in the DCPS system have an open-door policy. Parents have the right to visit their child's school and be actively involved in their education. However, visits must be with a purpose and not cause disruption or interruption to the school's daily operations and instruction. At Shepherd most parents are respectful of this policy; however, we need your support in making sure we all are respectful. Please do not interrupt your child's day to bring them lunch, money, homework, backpacks or other things that may have been forgotten. Please leave those items with personnel in the main office and we

PTA Meeting Highlights

Ward 4 Councilmember Muriel Bowser was the special invited guest to the Feb. 20 PTA meeting, speaking primarily on boundary redrawing issues.

In Ward 4, she said, the big shift
has been the introduction of more school choice
and competition than we've had in the past. The
District has had to deal with areas where school

Councilmember Bowser said she has told D.C. Public Schools Chancellor Kaya Henderson, both publicly and privately, that both Lafayette Elementary and Shepherd Elementary are unique and she ex-


pects their feeder pattern into Deal Middle School to remain the same. The problem is overcrowding at Deal and Wilson High School. Councilmember Bowser said that she values diversity and that "we won't draw a line down the middle of Rock Creek Park."

A DCPS panel or task force will be formed and we want to hold the chancellor accountable for the task force. What can the PTA do? Councilmember Bowser says to be vocal

and forceful — and to invite the chancellor to Shepherd to meet with parents and to ask her questions.

Councilmember Bowser said the city needs more quality high schools, but we can't build another school west of the park before we fix the schools east of the park. And even if we build shiny new schools, they still need good leadership to succeed. Some people say that Ward 4 doesn't need both Coolidge and Roosevelt high schools. Councilmember Bowser also said that the chancellor is considering the option of making all high schools "application schools."

She added the D.C. Council is creating a new education committee this year that will be chaired by David Catania. So far, his focus has been on truancy, but Councilmember Bowser promised to brief him on boundary issues.



Councilmember Bowser said it's important that the plan is not just for new buildings and facilities, but for strong new programs. Another parent commented that we must make sure that Shepherd students -- coming out of elementary school with a background in French and Spanish -- have someplace to go to continue that.

The reputation of a "bad" school is hard to change and this must be dealt with in rebuilding Coolidge and Roosevelt. A parent suggested moving every-

one to a swing space for a short time and then sending everyone back into a new culture at the same time. It's an expensive way to do it, but the break could change the culture. McFarland Middle School, now set to close, was not able to change its reputation in time.

Other suggestions included putting new, safe schools near Metro stations to help families commute to other areas. Also, to offer a gifted and tal-

ented program at Coolidge and Roosevelt, or something else no other school has, to make them desirable locations that some families will seek out. Another parent suggested a name change for these schools, following the concept that corporations use for re-branding to change the image of their products or programs.

The discussion included the observation that Ward 3 was the only ward without PreK-8 schools, which is why Deal is so popular. The feeder policy — once you get into an out-of-boundary elementary school you are entitled to follow that path to middle and high school — is good for those who get in, but not fair to those who don't because there's seldom another option of getting into the better schools later. The development of Walter Reed is going to add to traffic congestion for Shepherd families to cross the park to Deal and Wilson.

OVER THE (BOX) TOP!

Sherilyn Pruitt, Shepherd's Box Tops coordinator, reported that as a result of our end-of-the-month push for parents to turn in Box Tops for Education, she was able to process 1,984 Box Tops! They were mailed Friday, to Box Tops HQ, and if HQ accepts all of them, that means close to \$200 more than the \$488 already credited to Shepherd Elementary this year. Sherilyn said she thought Shepherd might become the District's best Box Tops school, and with this result, we're eager to see the final standings!

Cathy Reilly, director of the Senior High Alliance of Parents, Principals and Educators, the meeting's other special guest, said that about five years ago, feeder rights were added to boundary rights, causing overlaps. There has been discussion that maybe DCPS will move toward a policy where our only boundary is elementary school, and then, the only rights will be feeder rights.

Even at SHAPPE meetings, Reilly acknowledged, parents stressed the importance of neighborhood schools, but a high percentage of them were sending their kids elsewhere. She said it is important to think about the legacy of our neighborhoods and invest in the local schools, beyond just the school path of our own children, especially with an anticipated huge increase in kids starting school right behind our own kids. Even while advocating for our own rights to send our kids to Deal and on to Wilson, Reilly said, we must be on the side of success of Coolidge and Roosevelt for citywide consistency and success in education.

School diversity is good, but there are many types of diversity. The overcrowding at Deal and Wilson are a product of their success. A parent commented in favor of the feeder policy; without it, many parents would not opt for the out-of-boundary lottery in elementary school if they didn't know what would happen to them after that, and the alternative might be that families would leave the system. Reilly said we have to use our voices, to speak up, which will help not only our schools but other schools that don't have as strong a voice. Ms. Reilly promised to keep us informed and said to let her know if we want to be on the mailing list for SHAPPE or Coolidge.

THE SIT-UATION ROOM

The expanded School Improvement Team -which includes not only the original School Improvement Team at Shepherd, but Shepherd
students, representatives from D.C. Public
Schools, the D.C. Department of General Services, Lance Bailey Architects and Turner Construction -- is inching ever closer to developing
a comprehensive plan to renovate Shepherd
for not only our generation, but our children's
generation.

Representatives from Turner, which was awarded the construction contract by the District government, have been walking in and around the school virtually every day since the pact was signed. The "professional" members of the expanded SIT group are now meeting Tuesday mornings at the school to architecturally dot their I's and cross their T's. Shepherd teachers and staff know they're going to have to purge items and box the rest, and they're making decisions even now about how to best do that.

The one drawback is that our collective vision is too rich for the city's budget. The hard work of trying to defer an estimated \$2.5 million in renovations has yet to be made, and cannot be done until we get more solid estimates of the cost of each element of the renovation.

The expanded School Improvement Team will next meet Wednesday, March 13, at 5 p.m. in the school library. will be the blooming flowers of our educational garden. It's a NO-UNIFORM DAY. If you have not yet seen a picture order form, please go to the office for additional forms.




