Drop Everything and Read

Shepherd students continue to impress me about how knowledgeable they are about their reading level, their goals and what they need to do to meet



their goals. Have you taken time to ask your student their reading level, their reading goal, and their plan for reaching their goal? If not, please do so. Every student in this school is expected to know the answer to those questions and as a parent you should know as well. We are working diligently to create a school of readers at Shepherd and we will with all of us working together. Our most recent assessment data shows that 79 percent of our students are reading at or above grade level. As wonderful as that may be for some, it is not good enough for us! We have 21 percent of our students who are NOT reading at or above grade level, and that is unacceptable! As a school we are committed to 90 percent of our students reading at or above grade level and continuing to increase that each year until we have 100 percent of our students reading at or above grade level.

Family STEM Night

Family Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics Night was a huge success! We had over 75 students in attendance. During the evening, students participated in everything from estimating weight of items to building a gigantic roller coaster. The evening ended with a presentation by a representative of Mad Science of Washington. During her presentation she talked about chemical reactions. Students saw the effects of acid, color mixing and dry ice. It was a fun evening for all. Thank you, teachers and the Academic Committee, for your planning efforts!

Shepherd students have studied some of the old and some of the new.

LSAT MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Much of the March 12 Local School Advisory Team meeting dwelt on the 2013-14 budget figures handed to Shepherd by D.C. Public Schools head-quarters, and how best to make use of the money allocated.

DCPS is making more personnel positions mandatory for the upcoming school year, and granting fewer exceptions and exemptions. And even though all schools in DCPS are getting a 2 percent per-pupil increase, it would take more than that just to maintain everything — and everybody — that Shepherd has right now.

The LSAT gives advice and makes recommendations to the principal on budgetary matters, but the final decisions on how to move the money around rest with the principal. However, Mrs. Miles made a successful case to the powers that be at DCPS that allows Shepherd to keep almost — but not quite — everything we have this year.

Minutes from February's LSAT meeting are now posted on the LSAT page of the school website, at http://www.shepherd-elementary.org/parents/school-advisory-board/.

The next LSAT meeting is set for Tuesday, April 9, at 4 p.m. inside the school. Parents are always welcome to attend meetings, and since term limits will automatically create two vacancies on the LSAT, you may want to consider service on the LSAT for 2013-14— one way that you can help Shepherd. That's just the tip of iceberg, as it pertains to "Coach D's" coaching experience, but two of the elements that converged to inspire the new Tiger Elite Basketball Camp, to be held at Wilson this summer (yes, the same Wilson that we expect our students to attend).

The Tiger Elite Basketball Camp is open to boys and girls who will be entering grades one through eight -- in other words, most Shepherd students and some of their older siblings. There will be five week-long sessions offered in June and July with options for half-day participation and full-day participation, as well as both before-care and after-care. Each week is a self-contained session, but the camp offers multiplesession discounts. Camp will be held in Wilson High's newly renovated gym and sessions will be led by experienced, certified instructors.

Through speed and agility training, the Tiger Elite Basketball Camp will provide an excellent foundation for your child's future in basketball, as well as other sports. Each week, camp will include five days of skill development, training, conditioning, and motivational activities. And while the focus will be on the development of basketball skills, campers will enjoy a variety of other fun and enriching activities, including arts and crafts, games, and reading.

THE SIT-UATION ROOM

You've heard the expression, "My eyes were bigger than my stomach?" The same is true, in a sense with the upcoming renovations at Shepherd: Our eyes – really, our vision – is bigger than the budget the city is giving us.

So what we WON'T get in time for the next school year is a brand-spanking-new atrium and court-yard, or a fully finished ground floor underneath the original 1931 building. But what we WILL get instead is an extension of that ground floor immediately west of the original unfinished basement to house Shepherd's HVAC system and telecom/IT systems.

So what it looks like, to date is this: Shepherd will get \$10.1 million in renovations this summer, up from the original allocation of \$5.295 million, and another \$2.7 million or so in work after the new fiscal year kicks in come October.

A "future courtyard phase" including the unfinished basement, costing \$10 million, and cafeteria/kitchen and parking improvements slated at an estimated \$6 million, will be at some point in the future, quite possibly the 2017-18 school year. In total, D.C. is committing close to \$29 million to Shepherd, up about \$5 million from its original projections.

And staff from Ward 4 Councilmember Muriel Bowser's office is fully informed of developments, and if we need to fight for full and equitable funding, she'll be on our side.

We expect to have a combined PTA and Shepherd Park community meeting after the PTA meeting slated for April 17 -- which may very well be the same day work crews make their first appearance at Shepherd (but outside of school hours) -- to show our somewhat altered vision to everyone.
