PTA MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The big draw at last week's PTA meeting, was At-Large D.C. Councilmember David Catania, chairman of the Council's reconstituted Education Committee.

Catania answered questions following smallgroup discussion by parents and focusing on renovations, specialty programs like International Baccalaureate, and boundary redrawing.

Parents at one table noted that D.C. Public Schools touts IB and other programs as hallmarks within the school system, but doesn't give any extra money to fund those programs, leading to cuts elsewhere and threatening the very purpose behind those programs.

Catania responded that he is trying to develop a "weight" system in which a little extra money beyond the typical D.C. per-pupil formula would be given for a variety of different considerations. Academic programs like IB would benefit from one such weight. So would poverty, expressed by whether the pupil is eligible for free or reduced-price lunches.

On boundary redrawing work currently being done by a DCPS task force, Catania said he has recommended that any new feeder patterns don't take effect until 2015. Further, he issued his doubts that removing Shepherd and Barnard elementary schools from the feeder pattern to Deal Middle School would "survive the Department of Justice problem," meaning the

If you can help, email Mr. Burgess at jarrett.burgess@gmail.com. resegregation of minority groups in a majority-minority school district. Shepherd's population is majority-African American, while Barnard's is majority-Hispanic.

The touchy topic of renovations got a good going-over, as Catania said Shepherd was slated to receive only \$8.4 million in the current fiscal year ending Sept. 30 for Phase 1 renovations. He apparently misspoke. The D.C. Department of General Services, in tracking the budget line items for school renovations, said Shepherd should receive the \$8.4 million in addition to the \$5.295 million previously allocated.

The meeting was held in the cafeteria, which isn't slated to get its renovations until at least 2018. By holding the meeting there, Catania and his aide, Jamaal Jordan, were able to walk through the school and see for themselves the condition of the building, the newest part of which is 43 years old and hasn't seen any systematic renovation since that wing of the school was added in 1970.

Catania touched on the "go west" phenomenon as parents seeking better schools for their children head west, and often west of Rock Creek Park, to find a suitable school. "It's not helping the high schools either," he added, as capacity at Ward 4's Coolidge and Roosevelt high schools have sunk to 41-42 percent, while other high schools hover in the 50s. DCPS is spending \$8.5 million to expand Deal Middle School even more while Hardy Middle School in Ward 2 "has 250 empty seats and 60 percent enrollment."

He also criticized the DCPS budget process. "Opaque' does not even begin to describe it," Catania said. School personnel should be able to track where each dollar goes "from the time it enters the system to the time it gets to the student," he added, noting that 35 cents of each dollar spent is retained by DCPS administration.

THE SIT-UATION ROOM

For those who were at the PTA meeting Wednesday, we heard D.C. At-Large Councilmember David Catania say that the supplemental fiscal year 2013 budget for Shepherd was not going to be increased to \$10.1 million as we had expected, but only to \$8.4 million.

This was bad news, and set off several unhappy questions directed at Catania, who is chair of the Education Committee. It also set off a series of emails to the District's Department of General Services, plus contractor Turner Construction and architect Lance Bailey Associates, wondering if work was going to have to be delayed to later in Phase 1, deferred to Phase 2, skipped altogether, or done with cheaper materials and processes.

The answer: Catania apparently misspoke. The \$8.4 million is not the new final FY 2013 supplemental budget figure, but is IN ADDITION TO the original \$5.295 million in the original budget, making for a total of \$13.7 million. There is no change in the FY 2014 Phase 1 budget allocation of \$6.678 million, but when put together, the \$20.5 million to be voted on Wednesday by the full Council is more than the \$20.1 million our recent petition campaign and D.C. Council testimony had asked for (\$10.1 million for 2013, and at least \$10 million for 2014).

We should all closely monitor the situation, even to the point of watching the government access channel on cable. This is serious money we're talking about, and we have come too far and worked too hard to be insulted budget-wise.

The School Improvement Team has one more meeting left, on Wednesday, May 29, at 5 p.m. in the school library. At this meeting we expect to be able to dot our I's and cross our T's when it comes to preparing for the big community meeting on June 11 -- to which you are invited. The meeting begins at 6 p.m., and should take an hour or so.

You may have noticed that the patio north of the library has been fenced off so that more digging

work can be done in the basement. By the time winter break comes around in the NEXT school year, we should be able to call it the "ground floor." Workers are already at it. When I was doing some playground duty during the Teacher Appreciation Week luncheon, we had to shoo some students from one section of the playground so that a pickup truck could get to the service drive safely. The students were champs about it and could return to their play in two minutes.

For now, most work is being done on evenings and weekends, and disruptions like the one I've described are rare. But when school lets out for summer vacation, workers will descend upon Shepherd in earnest. It's part of a renovation plan that will stretch across this summer and the following school year and take up all of next summer, too -- with more work likely in 2018. LSAT members or the LSAT itself were either behind or a contributing factor to the establishment of the Safety Patrol, the continuation of the TV/Video Game Turnoff Club, the Get Caught Reading campaign, finding volunteer librarians, community engagement with the Shepherd Park Citizens Association, last month's combined beautification day and bike rodeo in honor of Earth Day, urging budget justice for Shepherd in the upcoming school year, and supporting a variety of academic endeavors such as the schoolwide Science Fair, the GeoPlunge teams, STEM Night with Mad Science, and the Spelling Bee.

And we're not done yet! The free-for-all Cultural Arts Night program on Friday, May 24, is an LSATconceived event. We're still working on ways to indicate student progress at Shepherd with colorful graphics. There is the continuous quest to bring greater safety to students (and civility among parents) in the whole drop-off and pickup process on school days. population. And our Gala annually raises tens of thousands of dollars to support the educational program at Shepherd that helps make those test scores possible.





Rachel Swarns, a former Shepherd parent, will be the featured speaker at an after-hours open


house Saturday, June 1, at the Shepherd Park Library, 7420 Georgia Ave. NW.


