2. Bobby McFerrin is a oneperson musical success story. A classically trained jazz pianist, Grammy-winning pop singer ("Don't Worry, Be Happy"), solo body-percussionist, and orches-



tra conductor, Bobby McFerrin steps across all the boundaries, showing that musicians don't have to stay in just one genre.

3. Harry Belafonte has been a beloved musician

and a social activist. Inspired by Paul Robeson, Belafonte used his fame and wealth to support rev. Martin Luther King Jr. and the civil rights movement. Belafonte helped Quincy Jones and Michael



Jackson create "We Are The World" to raise funds for famine relief in Africa. Now, in his 80s, Belafonte is working with incarcerated people to compose and perform blues and other songs as a method of rehabilitation. This year, the NAACP awarded Harry Belafonte its highest honor, the Spingarn Award.


