THE SIT-UATION ROOM

First of all, thanks to the parents, students and staff as well as neighbors who attended last Tuesday's community meeting on school renovations. For those who couldn't be there, look to the school website for links to the floor plans as well as a virtual slide show of what changes you can expect to see in our school after this summer and after next summer. If these visuals aren't already in place by the time you read this

in place by the time you read this, look to the PTA listserv for a notice that they're posted.

So, what will look different when you return to Shepherd after summer vacation? The short answer: Not that much, really. That's because the workers are focusing on infrastructure.

We can't do wholesale changes right now that would require enlarging the size of classrooms,

because then we'd be forced to reduce the number of classrooms – an absurd notion, considering that Shepherd is already at capacity.

So the work crews are focusing on five things.

The first aspect, already underway, is making the basement of the original building, put up in 1931, into usable space. This work, though, will probably take until winter break. But once it's done, the basement will contain the library, the computer lab, two language classrooms, a teachers' lounge, and two newly dug-out rooms for mechanical apparatus.

That brings us to the next two points. Shepherd is getting a new HVAC -- that's builder-speak for heating, ventilation and air conditioning -- system so that every room in the building is the same temperature, and the temperature stays consistent year-round, plus an electrical/tech upgrade that will allow the school to have triple its current power and Internet capacities.

Point four is a "deep cleaning" of all restrooms and lavatories currently in the building and, where possible, the installation of new, more ecofriendly plumbing and fixtures.

The fifth point will be the renovation of about half of the existing classrooms in the 1931 building.

Given that there's only so much money that can be spent over a 10-week summer period for renovation work, and with the priorities of the principal

and Shepherd's School Improvement Team, this is what will happen.

Renovations to most of the rest of the building will take place over summer 2014. This includes classroom enlargement in the 1956 and 1970 buildings and the repositioning of administrative offices. Shepherd is in line to get \$6.678 million in fiscal year 2014 to finish the job started last month; the D.C. Council will vote this Tues-

day, June 18, on the FY 2014 budget.

The primary focus of the current renovations zero in on where students spend most of the school day — in learning situations. Future renovations, probably five years into the future, will provide for a cafeteria expansion that will allow on-site meal preparation and (finally!) parking for some teachers and staff. We might even see a snazzy treatment of an atrium and courtyard when the main school entrance is reoriented to Kalmia Road and 14th Street.

The School Improvement Team will meet again this Wednesday, June 19, at 5 p.m. in the library to see where we go from here. If you have any question, get in touch with me at 202-829-9289 or Pattison_mark@hotmail.com.



We hope to bring you a new and improved Program next year with more special classes which last longer and are specifically designed for the needs and preferences of the different age groups of students. Details will be mailed and emailed in July.

Next School Year

All Shepherd families will receive a registration packet in the mail. Registration for school year 2013-14 will begin Aug. 1, and can be completed online, through the mail or in person. The time and place for in-person registration will be determined in August, depending on the status of the school renovation.

Next year, there will be a few notable changes in the program:

- ▶ Tuition will increase by \$5 per month to cover increased program costs. Per family registration fee will remain \$45 per family.
- Cash will not be accepted. We will accept money orders, checks and online payment as of August 1.

DON'T BLOCK THE CROSSWALK!

We've got just one week left in the school year, but there's always time to practice good driving etiquette and to be a model to your children — OUR children.

Don't block the crosswalks, either at 14th and Jonquil or 14th and Kalmia. Other students and their parents need to be able to see clearly whether traffic is coming in either direction before they can cross safely.

If you feel you need to park in the crosswalk because you're running late, it won't kill you

to leave earlier. But what if it did kill somebody because you couldn't be bothered to park legally? The stigma and the trauma on both you and everyone at



Shepherd would be unbearable.

So do the right thing.

- ▶ There will be more multi-grade classes; i.e., if there are more third-grade students than can be safely cared for with current staffing ratios older third-grade students may be included in the 4th-grade class.
- Scholarship program criteria have changed -details will be mailed to those currently receiving or those interested in scholarships.
- Pre-K, kindergarten and first grade will be separated from the older students and have more group activities.
- Each registered family will receive a handbook which includes expectations for student behavior.

PTA Budget Summary

On behalf of the PTA executive board, I extend a heartfelt thank you to all of the parents, teachers, and friends of Shepherd Elementary School who supported our PTA activities with monetary donations and/or volunteer time. During this school year our expenses totaled \$44,589.70 versus our generated revenue of \$54,596.95. This leaves us with a fund balance of \$10,007.25. *So we will start out the 2013 -14 school year with \$10,000 more than where we started this year!* The PTA budget presented at the beginning of the school year included several expenses that we were able to streamline.



PTA MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Thursday's PTA meeting was short but sweet, but not without its highlights (including Angelico Pizza!).

The Gala Committee's report indicated great satisfaction with the outcome of last month's event. The silent auction brought in roughly the same revenue as in past years, but the live auction and the SEED (Shepherd Elementary Educational Development) contributions were significantly up. Expenses were also kept down. Turnout was a bit lower than in past years, but those who came were ready to spend. People also liked the Wilson High School atrium setting. There were very few auction items that received no bids, and the committee is still working to sell some of the lovely tote bags decorated by students in Ms. Gibbs' pre-K class.



Unlike the past few years, the auction did not feature a raffle, but a raffle will be conducted at the start of the school year.

LSAT and PTA election results were announced (see separate article in the Mustang).

Principal Miles expressed her appreciation for the PTA's efforts. Such things as the newsletter and paying for the teacher wish lists make her job a lot easier. She said if teacher-grade assignments aren't in the current Mustang, they'll be sent in a letter to parents in early July. (In late July or early August, teacher-student assignments will be listed.) Registration numbers are already at 200, she added; it's typically at 50 by this time of the year. The high numbers make it more possible for teachers to stay assigned to Shepherd.

Treasurer Kim Barnette's report met with approval, because there's nearly \$38,000 in the treasury! Even though 180 Fund contributions were at half of budgeted levels, and the teacher wish lists could have put a strain on the budget, the PTA really reined in other spending, especially with postage and paper supplies. Auction proceeds from the Gala also helped boost the bank account.

Teachers have been busy packing up their classrooms in anticipation of the ongoing renovations. Much will be stored in the cafeteria and auditorium. Teachers could use every bit of help they can get. The workers would like to start in earnest at noon on the last day of school, but Principal Miles is trying to hold them off until 8 p.m.
