It's Report Card Time

LSAT- Meeting Rescheduled



Student Behavior

You may be surprised to learn about some of the things your students do when you are not around. Please continue to speak with your student about making good choices. Encourage them to choose their friends wisely and don't give into peer pressure. If students see or hear of any behaviors that are not appropriate, they should let an adult know. At Shepherd there is no such thing as being "a snitch."

Attendance Matters

In general, Shepherd students come to school. Our attendance rate to date is 97%. This mean on average 97% of our students attend school daily. Way to go, parents and students! Please continue to schedule appointments and vacations, after school or on days when students are out of school. If your student is absent please send a note to Mrs. Brooks. Remember, the only excused absences are: death of an immediately family member, religious holiday, or sickness. All other absences are considered unexcused. Shepherd students come to school; however, many of our students arrive late. When students arrive late, they feel rushed, they don't have time to settle in before beginning their day and they often have to play catch-up because they are late. This is not fair to our students. Parents, please work to get your students to school on time. If you need supports please let us know.

Shepherd recognizes attendance is important and we want to celebrate students who arrive to school daily and on time. At Shepherd...

- Students who arrive on time and attend school every day will be recognized during our quarterly Awards Day ceremony.
- The classes with perfect attendance (100% attendance and no tardies) will be recognized during our morning assembly at the start of each week.
- The class and teacher with the highest number of days with perfect attendance (100% attendance and no tardies) at the end of the quarter will be rewarded.

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Canned Food Drive Continues

Shepherd is collecting donations of canned and other nonperishable food items this week and next week to help stave off hunger.

As you may know, the first cut EVER in federal "food stamp" benefits took effect Nov. 1. It's a 13 percent cutback. That means families are scrambling for ways to stretch already-tight food budgets.

And Congress is considering even deeper cuts. The Senate would trim \$4 billion from Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits over the next 10 years. But the House version of the same bill would gouge the SNAP benefits by nearly \$40 billion. One anti-hunger lobby, Bread for the World, estimated that if the House version took effect, that means that EVERY church congregation in America would have to supply nearly \$15,000 worth of food every year for the next decade just to keep things where they are.

All the canned goods collected will go to Shepherd's Table, a nearby private charity in Silver Spring that distributes canned goods, prepares meals and has a clothes



closet for poor people in our area. Please be generous!

Shepherd Elementary School is now officially a compost and recycling school. Our students participated in a Compost assembly Oct. 31. They learned about the importance and the significance of the three bins we use in the cafeteria (blue, yellow and grey) and what happens to the food and the materials that we throw out. They learned that in the yellow bin, we put things like: food scraps, paper towels, napkins, compostable trays, and used/soiled paper products. In the blue bin: plastic bottles, jugs and containers, glass bottles and jars, aluminum cans, foil and milk cartons. In the grey bins, we put items that are not recyclable or compostable like plastic utensils/ straws, utensil wrappers, candy/snack wrappers, plastic/shrink wrap, plastic bags, and chip/snack bags. Students have been doing a really good job in the cafeteria organizing their trash and demonstrating their responsibility for our earth.

The Energy Club

Our school has been working with the District Department of the Environment since the latter part of the 2012-2013 school year to implement an Energy Patrol Program. The program's goals are to reduce energy use and costs in our school. This year, we have 10 students who have been selected to participate in the Energy Patrol Club. Monthly Profile and Attitude

As a school community, our challenge this month is to acknowledge and to encourage student's critical and creative thinking skills. This month's Learner Profile is Thinker. A thinker is someone that uses critical and creative thinking skills to analyze and take responsible action on complex problems. A thinker exercises initiative in making reasoned, ethical decisions.

Critical thinking involves analyzing and evaluating one's own thinking and that of others. In order to develop your critical thinking skills you can:

- Ask questions and problem solve
- Gather and assess information
- Try to interpret abstract ideas
- Draw conclusions and provide solutions after doing relevant research
- · Being open minded and
- Effectively communicating to others your solutions to complex challenges

Creative thinking is the origination of new ideas within or across domains of knowledge. It involves the behaviors of preparation, incubation, insight, evaluation, elaboration, and communication. Creative thinking should deliberately and actively engage students in:

- Bringing to life existing ideas;
- Developing new possibilities for something that already exists; and
- Discovering or imagining something entirely new.

SHEPHERD STUDENTS LEARN COMPOSTING

Shepherd Elementary received a quick but thorough lesson on the ins and outs of composting at an assembly held early Oct. 31. The ins and the outs refer specifically to the color of the bin for their lunchroom waste in the cafeteria.

Blue bin: Recycling. This includes paper products like milk cartons and water bottles

Yellow bin: Composting. This is for food waste such as banana peels and uneaten sandwiches.

White bin: Liquids. This is to pour that bit of milk, water or juice you didn't drink at lunch

Gray bin: Trash. This means plastic sandwich bags.

Two enthusiastic representatives from D.C.'s Department of General Services, Ms. Beth and Ms. Brooke, performed a skit that showed how easy it can be to recycle and compost once you know what goes where.

Recycling, they explained, is what happens when "you take something and make something better." Paper can be recycled because "paper comes from trees, and trees are plants," they said.

Compost, they added, makes for healthy soil.

By recycling and composting, they said, people cut down on the amount of trash that goes into landfills. "There really aren't any good places for building a landfill, and no place to put trash," they noted. Trees are cut down to make landfills, they added, and people living near landfills find the air is "gross and stinky."

Ms. Brooke and Ms. Beth, with the help and encouragement of students, helped Ms. McIntyre and Mr. Leonard properly dispose of the waste in their lunchboxes. Mr. Leonard stress the need to "reuse, reduce and recycle." And to help accomplish that aim, every Shepherd student was to get a recyclable water bottle they could hook onto their backpacks, thereby cutting down on the need for plastic pre-bottled water.
