<u>UPDATES:</u> Tuition payment is due by Friday, Jan. 10 this month (rather than the 5th), so please pay promptly. We will be using QuickBooks automatic invoicing for those who do not pay on time; this means late fees will be charged to you beginning Jan 12.

Picking up children: Please note that with the potential change in assigned rooms, your student may be coming UP the stairs to the first floor and might take a bit longer to gather his/her belongings and make it to the front desk. Please be patient while we iron out logistics and enjoy the use of the new space.

Happy New Year Shepherd community! Welcome to January 2014. This week will be a busy one as we get back to our schedules and our routines. The Learner Profile trait is **Risk Taker**. International Day 2013

International Day was a great success. It began with classroom visits learning about Christmas in different parts of the world and ended with our Winter Concert. The Winter Concert was well attended and had over 200 students participating. The concert consisted of singing, rapping, dancing, Congo/Bongo Drums, Tambourines, Xylophones, Maracas, Recorders, and Dreidels. The entertainment had a truly international flavor and was enjoyed by all who attended.

The Theme for International Day was Christmas Around the World. Thanks to all of our parent volunteers who were able to assist. We couldn't have done it without you. Here is a small sample of what we learned (information taken from www.santas.net):

- ▶ Christmas in the U.S.A. This first Santa Claus was known as St. Nicholas, which came from the Dutch culture. The Dutch had bought him with them in the 17th century, when they came to America. The word Santa Claus was the Dutch word for St Nicholas, Sintaklaas. Back then, Santa Claus smoked a pipe, and flew around in a wagon without reindeer. He did not have his red suit or live at the North Pole; he did, however, bring presents to children every year. In 1863, he was given the name Santa Claus and bore the red suit, pipe, and his reindeer and a sleigh. Now, Christmas celebrations vary greatly between regions of the United States, because of the variety of ethnic groups that have settled here.
- ▶ Christmas in Canada Christmas celebrations are quite similar in variety to the United States. In Canada, the traditional Christmas dinner is roast turkey with cranberry sauce, other sauces and vegetables. In most provinces turkey is accompanied by fresh or smoked salmon. For dessert it is rich, fruity Christmas pudding with brandy sauce. Or perhaps mince pies and pastry cases filled with a mixture of chopped dried fruit. In Quebec, a Christmas banquet is called a reveillon. One favorite food in Quebec is Boulettes, or small meatballs. People display crèches or nativity scenes in their homes as Christmas decorations. In Newfoundland and Nova Scotia, Masked Mummers are a Christmas tradition, during the twelve days of Christmas small groups of belsnicklers, or masked mummers, appear in neighborhoods, ringing bells, making noise, seeking candy or other treats. The hosts may try to guess who the mummers are and if they guess right the mummer removes his or her disguise and stops making rude noises and actions. Children may be quizzed by the mummers on their behavior if they say they have been good they are rewarded with candy.
- ▶ Christmas in France On Christmas Eve, children leave their shoes by the fireplace to be filled with gifts from Pere Noel. In the morning, they also find that sweets, fruit, nuts and small toys have been hung on the tree. The Christmas tree has never been particularly popular in France, and though the use of the Yule log has faded, the French make a traditional Yule log-shaped cake called the buche de Noel, which means "Christmas Log." The cake, among other food in great abundance, is served at the grand feast of the season, which is called le reveillon. Le reveillon is a very late supper held after Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve.
- ▶ Christmas in Spain In Spain it is a very festive time at Christmas. On Christmas Eve, as the stars come out, tiny oil lamps are lit in every house, and after Midnight Mass and Christmas dinner, streets fill with dancers and onlookers. There is a special Christmas dance called the *Jota* and the words and music have been handed down for hundreds of years. They dance to the sound of guitars and castanets. Shoes are filled with straw or barley for the tired camels that must carry their riders through the busy night. By morning the camel food is gone and in place of the straw or barley are presents. Shoes also may be placed on balconies on the night of January 6 in the hope that the Wise Men will fill them with gifts.

Christmas in Ethiopia - In Ethiopia Christmas day is January 7, so on Christmas Eve (January 6) the city is crowded with pilgrims from all parts of the country. People receive candles as they enter church services. After lighting the candles everyone walks around the church three times, and then stands throughout the Mass, which may last up to three hours. Food served at Christmas usually includes injera, a sourdough pancake like bread. **Injera**serves as both plate and fork. Doro wat, a spicy chicken stew, might be the main meal. A piece of the injera is used to scoop up the wat. Baskets decorated beautifully are used to serve the wat. Gift giving is a very small part of Christmas celebration. Children usually receive very simple presents such as clothing.



LSAT Update

Even though school was shut down Dec. 10th in anticipation of the snowstorm that never happened, Shepherd's Local School Advisory team met via conference call. They continued to plunge into an ambitious agenda, considering more than two dozen items dealing with parent and community engagement, academic achievement and the school's culture and climate.

The idea was raised on a "pair-a-parent" mentoring system in which new-to-Shepherd parents would be paired with "veteran" parents to get a heads-up on how the school functions.

The LSAT is also trying to prepare a list of locations in zip codes 20012 and 20011 — where a significant percentage of Shepherd parents live – to get together at rec centers or restaurants to bond more closely.

Shepherd will also be working up greater parental support for the Science Fair this month, including transporting student projects a mile away to the NOAA headquarters in Silver Spring.

One parent on the LSAT is collecting information on the Igniting Creative Energy competition for students — another venue that, like GeoPlunge and the spelling bee, puts students' minds to work for fun and achievement.

Another LSAT member with deep knowledge of databases will assist the PTA in finding the right database to allow it to harness member information most effectively.

The LSAT also collaborated with the principal on a letter to be sent to parents in the new year seeking their commitment of 10 volunteers hours at Shepherd between now and the end of the school year.

The team also committed to a second year of Cultural Arts Night, featuring family-friendly artists and performers from the neighborhood and the surrounding area.

Likewise, the LSAT committed to a second year of the Bike Rodeo, and efforts are already under way to find the best date possible for it, as Bike to School Day will be observed nationwide on May 7th.

The next LSAT meeting is set for Wednesday, Jan. 15th, at 4 p.m. Parents are invited to attend, although if confidential matters arise, they may have to step out of the meeting. between 8:20 and 8:35 a.m. each day. I know instruction begins at 8:45 am and if the gym doors are closed, my student is late.

- ▶ I will adhere to all traffic rules and refrain from impeding pickup/drop-off time or causing a disruption during pickup and drop-off.
- I will remain calm, attentive and respectful during pickup and drop-off.
- I will enter and exit through the main entrance only.
- I will sign in at the security desk and check in at the main office before proceeding to the classroom.
- I will make sure that my student is prepared for school each day.
- ▶ I will limit classroom visits during the day unless I am volunteering or it is a scheduled visit. Forgotten items (money, lunch, homework, etc.) will be left in the main office.
- ▶ I will label my students' belongings because if they are lost, I would like for them to be found and returned to me.
- If I have a problem, I will address it with my child's teacher first.
- I will read with my student each night, practice their math facts and assist in the completion of all additional assignments.
- I will volunteer to help my child's school.
- I will not send my student to school sick.
- ▶ I will send them in appropriate clothing. If it is cold outside my student will at least have a hat and coat each day for outside recess. On their PE day my student will have on safe shoes that will allow them to safely engage in physical activity.
- I will make sure that my student is in school uniform each day. I know when I allow my student to dress out of uniform it sends a message that it is okay to not follow the rules.
- I will not pick my student up early from school unless it is an emergency.
- I will read the Mustang and my grade-level newsletter so that I will be an informed parent.
- I will make sure I know my student's reading level and generally how they are performing academically and will do my part to make sure that my student is making progress. In addition, I will hold my school accountable and together we will make sure Shepherd students receive the best education possible.

Next Family Dinner Night at Pete's Apizza!

We've got Family Dinner Night all day for one day next week. Our restaurant partner is Pete's New Haven Style Apizza at 962 Wayne Ave. in Silver Spring. It's across the street from the Wayne Avenue garage (parking is free if you manage to stay past 8 p.m.).

But here's the deal -- and it's a great one. The hours are all day: 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. Pete's is going to give us 25 percent of the receipts if we say we're from Shepherd.

And the deal is good for dine-in, take-out AND delivery! Pete's also has a generous delivery area. It includes all of Shepherd Park and most of Takoma Park, east of Georgia Avenue from the D.C.-Maryland line, down Blair Road to Piney Branch Road. The delivery area then includes a big chunk of Brightwood, from Georgia and Piney Branch, south on Georgia to Missouri, then west to 16th Street.

Say you leave from school to park in the garage and eat at Pete's Apizza. Once inside Pete's, you'll see menus on the counter with pizzas, pastas, appetizers, salads and dessert (especially gelato). You make your order and pay at the counter. Then you choose a table. Every table has a number on it, and servers will bring your food to your table. And there are dozens of tables to choose from. And from the time you leave Shepherd until the time you leave Pete's, you're done in 45 minutes!

Because this Family Dinner Night also takes place during the day, you can choose to have lunch there (and maybe even come back at night for something else). Pete's also sells pizza by the slice if you don't think you can eat a whole pizza by yourself and don't care to take it home.

To call ahead for take-out or delivery, Pete's number is 301-588-7383. And, because of the delicate parking situation, you can get curbside service for your to-go order if you pay over the phone with a credit card! To get a sneak peek at the menu, go to http://petesapizza.com/.

Meeting time is at 6:30 p.m. School starts on time, and so do PTA meetings!




Recycle That Old Cell Phone!
