Cell Phones

Lately there has been an increased number of cell phones taken from students during school hours. Please be reminded that students' cell phones must be turned off during the



school day. If a student is caught using their cell phone during the day it will confiscated and returned only to a parent or guardian. If your student is caught with a cell phone a second time, the phone will be confiscated and kept for two school days. Failure to adhere to the policy will result in more severe consequences (i.e., Saturday detention). If you need to speak with your child during the day, call the school; if your student needs to speak to you, we will allow them to use the phone.

This past week students received their report cards. Please take time to review the report with your student and ask questions. Discuss goals that have been set and see how your student is progressing. At this age, all students progress at different rates; however, we do expect to see progress. If your student does not appear to be progressing or if you have questions about their progress, please contact your child's teacher.

Attendance Matters!

Our conversations with parents and students about ontime arrival and daily attendance at school continues. It is imperative that our students are in school every day (unless they are sick) and they arrive on time. To date we have 110 students with 10 or more tardies, and only 54 students with no tardies.

Students who are frequently tardy have lower GPAs, lower scores on standardized assessments, and lower

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- Students who are frequently tardy have lower GPAs, lower scores on standardized assessments, and lower graduation rates. Chronic tardiness in elementary and middle school is also linked to failure in high school.
- In the National Center for Education Statistics' 2007
 Indicators of School Crime and Safety, teachers surveyed reported that students who are frequently tardy have higher rates of suspension and other disciplinary measures. Tardiness causes students to feel disconnected with school, leading to behavior problems and dropouts.
- Students who are frequently tardy to school are also more apt to be fired from a job for showing up late.
- When students are tardy, they negatively impact their teachers and other students. Teachers are often required to allow tardy students to make up work, which often requires them to restructure their lessons or reteach missed material. Tardiness also takes other students' attention away from a teacher's lesson, leading to more behavior problems and missed instruction. (Research conducted by the U.S. Department of Education)

Early Arrivers

If your student is not in before-care, they may not arrive to school for breakfast until after 8 a.m.; students who arrive before 8 will be turned away and their parent will be notified. You are encourage to enroll your student in our before care program if you need to drop your student off before 8 a.m.

Paced Interim Assessment

Students in grades 2-5 will resume their interim assessments on Wednesday, Feb. 19. Please strive to make sure your student arrives to school daily and they arrive on time.

DCCAS Update

This year our second-grade students will not participate in the District of Columbia Comprehensive Assessment (DCCAS). Two years ago the Office of State Superintendent of Education made a decision to include second-graders in this annual exam. However, the decision has been revisited and it was decided that second-graders will no longer take the annual comprehensive exam. They will however, continue to take the Paced Interim Assessment, which is administered each quarter.

Traffic Safety Tip



Once you drop off your child at school, there's no reason to linger at curbside. Not only are you holding up other parents who want to drop off their children – or have to double-park in the street to do so, here's one heath reason NOT TO LINGER:

Asthma.

In the United States, about 20 million people have asthma. Nearly 9 million of them are children; that's close to half of all asthma sufferers. And we all know children who live in urban areas are more likely to get asthma. Children have smaller airways than adults, which makes asthma especially serious for them. Children with asthma may experience wheezing, coughing, chest tightness, and trouble breathing, especially early in the morning or at night, which is prime drop-off and pickup time.

Many things can cause asthma. Among them are allergens, weather, exercise, infections, and irritants such as air pollution — including car exhaust.

Why should it be your car whose exhaust puts a Shepherd student over the line for asthma, or an asthma attack? Get to school, get the student in or out of the car, and get away. If you can't do that, then park and walk to school. We'll all breathe easier for it.

Jazz Night Salutes...

Benjamin Francis Webster (March 27, 1909–Sept 20, 1973), aka "The Brute" or "Frog," was an influential American jazz tenor saxophonist. Webster, born in Kansas City, Mo.,

is considered one of the three most important "swing tenors" along with Coleman Hawkins and Lester Young. He had a tough, raspy, and brutal tone on stomps (with his own distinctive growls), yet on ballads he played with warmth and sentiment. Stylistically he was indebted to alto star Johnny Hodges, who, he said, taught him to play his instrument.

Webster learned to play piano and violin at an early age before learning to play the saxophone. Once Budd Johnson showed him some basics on the saxophone, Webster began to play that instrument in the Young Family Band (which at the time included Lester Young). K.C. at this point was a melting pot from which emerged some of the biggest names in 1930s jazz, and Webster joined Bennie Moten's legendary 1932 band that included Count Basie, Oran "Hot Lips" Page and Walter Page.

Playing with Duke Ellington's orchestra for the first time in 1935, by 1940 Webster had become its first major tenor soloist. He credited Hodges, Ellington's alto soloist, as a major influence on his playing. During the next three years he was on many famous recordings, including "Cotton Tail" and "All Too Soon"; his contribution (together with that of bassist Jimmy Blanton) was so important that Ellington's orchestra during that period is known as the Blanton–Webster band. Webster left the band in 1943 after an angry altercation. In an interview with the Newark Star-Ledger in 2003, trumpeter Clark Terry claimed that Webster left Ellington because he slapped Duke, and was subsequently given two weeks' notice.

After leaving Ellington in 1943, Webster worked on 52nd

A Word About Jazz Night From Its Founder Bring the Family to Shepherd School Auditorium Come as you are. Most casual.

Friday, Feb. 28 (video at 6 p.m., dinner and program 6:30 p.m.)

- Did you know that jazz is a musical art form that the U.S. Congress deemed a "rare and valuable national American treasure to which we should devote our attention, support and resources to make certain it is preserved, understood and promulgated"?
- Did you know that jazz is also called "The American Classical Music"?
- Did you know that jazz music is taught, practiced and appreciated around the globe?!
- Did you know that when the founder of the Annual Shepherd Jazz Night first approached the then-principal of Shepherd, Mrs. Edith Smith, and the PTA in 1989 with the idea to have an event designed to share knowledge of the history of jazz and to foster its appreciation in a wholesome family and community-based atmosphere at the school while

at the same time eating pot-luck "soul food dinner," they had the vision to embrace it and initiate it! Why, it turned out to be the best attended and likely the most highly regarded of PTA-sponsored events ever. All of the following principals and PTAs, over the years have seen fit to keep this school-community tradition alive and now we are upon its "silver anniversary."

The Shepherd Jazz Mini-Festival, as it was first called, has always been aimed at developing musical and cultural interests and historical knowledge particularly in young people, but to develop them as audience members, too. This is done through providing all the opportunity to experience along with their parents the youth and professional-level performances live and up-close. Children are able to actually sit on the floor around the bandstand if they like, or dance of course. Based on observations, some are clearly inspired by the experience and become artists themselves.

Many great musicians have performed at SJN, some who were once Shepherd students themselves. For example, we now see a star on the local and national scene by the name of Marcus Johnson. I recall when he played for us at Shepherd, the stand holding his keyboard collapsed in the middle of a song, and he kept right on playing with the keyboard supported by his legs, as if nothing had happened. We have always especially extended the invitation to the Coolidge Senior High School Jazz Ensemble to play, in that their members are closer in age to the elementary students and it gives the young players a chance to perform before a supportive audience in their own community. They have always performed with distinction and some of their students have gone on to the professional ranks, under the tutelage of their great and dedicated director, Mr. Benjamin Sands.

Important Note: Please expect your child to bring home several biographical sketches of great jazz musicians and additional information in the weeks leading up to the event. It is hoped that you and your child/children will read them together. Please also take the "teachable moments" to discuss good listening behavior and things like respect for the artists when one is a member of an audience. You might remind them of how they appreciated the listening audience when they performed. Of course, this will maximize the educational benefits and enjoyment for all. The artists look forward to seeing you and yours there and always appreciate your support!

Profound thanks are due to all of the people, too many to name, that have made this important event possible each year. However, we must recognize Mrs. June Confer for her many years of helping and coordinating support and logistics through the main office from the very beginning, and who has attended every year, even now after her retirement.






Street in New York City; recorded frequently as both a leader and a sideman; had short periods with Raymond Scott, John Kirby, and Sid Catlett, as well as with Jay McShann's band, which also featured blues shouter Jimmy Witherspoon. In 1948 he returned briefly to the Ellington orchestra for a few months.

In 1953 he recorded "King of the Tenors" with pianist Oscar Peterson, who would be an important collaborator for Webster throughout the decade. Along with Peterson, trumpeter Harry "Sweets" Edison and others he was by now touring and recording with Norman Granz's Jazz at the Philharmonic outfit... "Coleman Hawkins Encounters Ben Webster," with fellow tenor saxophonist Hawkins, was recorded Dec. 16, 1957, is a jazz classic, the coming together of two giants of the tenor saxophone, who had first met in Kansas City.

Webster generally worked steadily but in 1964 he moved permanently to join other American jazz musicians in Europe. He lived in London for a year, followed by four years in Amsterdam and made his last home in Copenhagen in 1969. In 1971 Webster reunited with Duke Ellington and his big band for a couple of shows at the Tivoli Gardens in Denmark and he recorded "live" in France with Earl Hines.
